## Falcon Track Team Places In St.'s Top 25

The Farmington Falcon track team did a commendable job last Saturday by placing in the top 25 in the state Class A finals at Ann Arbor.

Don Hunt ran the fastest mile of his life but could place only second to Bob Richards of Bloomfield Hills. Don's time was 4:18.2, which was especially fast for the loose track and blistering heat. He ran the race just as he had planned and held a slight lead with about two hundred yards to go. Richards had a little more kick over the line and won by a few yards.

Gary Schulz qualified for the fastest heat of the open 440, but could not cope with his blazing opponents. Ron Smalley and Gary Lockwood also competed in open events for the Falcons. Smalley (high hurdles) and Lockwood (220-yard dash) failed to make the finals.

Farmington's 800-meter team ran well and managed to place in the state's top ten. The team was comprised of the Lockwood brothers, Russ Robinson, and Dick Moore. In the mile relay, the Falcon held a lead halfway through on the running of John Lockwood and Joe Watson. But the last two runners, Dennis Hunt and Gary Schulz, were too exhausted from their all-out efforts in their other respective events and the team failed to gain any points.

The Falcons placed high in the extremely tough competition and did better than any other interest team. Farmington will compete in the Oakland County meet tomorrow at Ferndale High School.

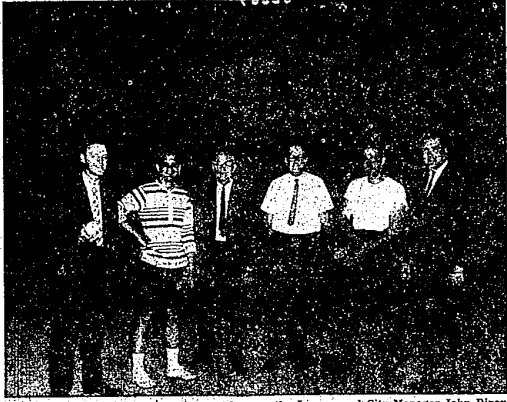

## OLS Athletcs Awarded College Scholarships

Our Lady of Sorrows High School athletes, Mike Coleman and Stan Secosky, this week signed letters for scholarships at two widely separated universities.

Coleman, the 215-pound Lancer guard who captured All-State honors as a standout performer on the 1963 Championship football team at OLS, accepted an athletic scholarship offer from the University of Pittsburgh.

Coleman, in addition to being named to the All-State grid team, was named to the All-Detroit Catholic League team and the All-Oakland County squad. He will report for freshman football at Pitt in September.

Pitt's team was ranked third in the nation among football powers in 1963.

Stan Secosky, an All-State wrestler who this spring captured three championships in major wrestling tournaments, accepted an athletic scholarship to this University of Wyoming.

Secosky's latest triumph came earlier this month when he won the Canadian National Wrestling Championship in the 135-pound division. He will compete in August at the New York World's Fair for a place on the United States Olympic team before heading for the University of Wyoming.

Secosky also was a teammate of Coleman's on the Lancer football team where he played fullback. Secosky, who tipped the scales at 170 pounds during the football season, was named to the All-Northwest Catholic League football team last fall.
