Falcon Thinclads Trounce Waterford Skippers, 63-43

The record smashing Falcon thinclads smartly trounced a weak and graduation hunched Waterford team by the score of 63-43 Wednesday, May 20.

Farmington led coming out of the field events (a Falcon phenomenon) and Berkeley never gained a threatening stride on the powerhouse cindermen.

Sophomores George Habisch split first place honors in the High Jump with a Berkeley Bear. Senior Dan Clifford backed his teammate by capturing a second Neil Warriner and Ron Smedley took first place points in the Shot Put and the Broad Jump as Mark Williams took a third in the Pole Vault.

In the sprint events, Farmington took first and third in each event except for the 400 where Gary Schulz and Dick Moore fought for first and second. The 100 yard dash saw John Lockwood run a 10.3 and Russ Robinson take a close third. Schulz ran a Clarence Bell Field record breaking time of 51.7 in the 400. Moore's 52.4 was quite enough to pace the Cinderman Flash time by Schulz. Lockwood's time of 22.4 was speedy enough to grab first place honors in the 220 ahead of once again third place Robinson.

Ron Smedley continued to be the leading Varsity point holder when he took first and second in the 120 yard low hurdles and the 180 high.

In the distance runs, Farmington kept the first and third point mounting rally established earlier. 880 fell to Joe Watson and Larry Gruff ran 2:07.7, the first time in his career in third place effort.

Mile King Dennis Hunt easily marched the distance in 4:28:10 to set a new Bell Field record. Nobody seems to remember who held it previously. Third place went to Junior John Karwowski.

Farmington's booming relay teams flashed for the fans in another record breaking day. The 880 Relay squad set a new Bell Field record of 1:32.4 for their event. The Mile Relay squad of Karwowski, Moore, Watson and Hunt ran a record time of 3:32.5.

All in all, the real excitement came when shot putter Don "Nobody" Umphrey took over the P.A. announcing duties. His loud and clear call for the 180 lows was appreciated by many D.S.
