Detroit-Tiger Baseball Games Don't Last as Long Anymore

'DETROIT - The fellow who claimed that baseball games are too long and getting longer certainly wasn't among the fans at Tiger Stadium last season. In 1968, the Tigers: 1-Knocked 10 minutes off the average length of their nine-inning home games, dropping from 2:37 in 1967 to 2:27 in 1968; 2-Played 15 games (eight at home) in two hours or less; 3-Breathed through one home contest (against Washington Sept. 20) in 40 hours and 41 minutes, their shortest game in more than three years.

"These figures ought to completely refute any claim that baseball games are too long," Tiger General Manager James L. Campbell commented when he examined the results of a Tiger Stadium survey.

"In any form of sports, or the field of entertainment for that matter, a 2-1/2 hour period is considered just about ideal," Campbell said. "The Tigers certainly conform to that pattern."

"As a matter of fact, the longest nine-inning game at Tiger Stadium last year was only four minutes over three hours. That was the first game of a double-header - and the second game lasted only an hour and 58 minutes. What's wrong with that?"

The Tigers' 10-minute reduction in playing time was tops in the American League, although matched by Kansas City. However, the "fastest" home team was the Los Angeles Angels, winning New York, with a two-hour, 20-minute average.

Campbell praised the Tigers for their reduction, and predicted more to come.

"Our team has shown what can be done and I feel we will go on from there," the Tiger executive said.

Both major leagues shared in the drop in playing time last year. The 10 teams in the American League averaged 2:25 in 1967, compared with 2:21 in 1968, while the National League teams dropped from 2:38 to 2:29.

The Tigers of 1963 played even faster on the road than they did at home. The average for 16 nine-inning road games was 2:25, compared with the 2:27 for 73 home games of regular length.

The "three-hour game" which some critics have attempted to pin on baseball happened to the Tigers only 15 times in their entire 162-game schedule last season - and 10 of the 15 were over 3 1/2 hours, ranging up to 3 1/2 hours.

Even with the extra-inning games, the Tigers' average elapsed time for a game was barely more than the 2 1/2-hour target, coming out at 2:32 both at home and on the road.

The 1963 game in the strike zone was responsible for much of the reduction in playing time, according to Tiger Vice-President Rick Ferrell, who is a member of the baseball rules committee.

"More batters were swinging at the ball in 1963," Ferrell commented on the enlarged strike zone. "The umpires and the league had to make adjustments. As a result, there were fewer time-wasting walks and better all-around pitching performances to help speed up the play in general."

Weather information, obtained from the U. S. Weather Bureau Station at the Houston Airport, was made available on punched cards, one for each hour, 8:34 a.m. for the (leap) year. "Furthermore, suicide tends to take place inside buildings most often in the home, while homicide typically occurs away from home, frequently outdoors, thus more possibly influenced by the state of the weather," the doctor explained.

The same procedure of charting and correlating homicides and weather conditions led to a similar conclusion. "No significant relationship was found."

St. Police Warn Parents About Molesters

Because child molesting increases sharply in warm weather or months, parents are strongly urged by Sgt. Adolph Floehin, commander of the Detroit State Police p.s.4, to warn the youngsters of the possible dangers in contacts with strangers who offer gifts of candy or money and want them to go for rides or walks.

This has been an annual warning by the State Police. SERGEANT FLOEHIN advised parents to report all molesting incidents to police with as many details as possible. This helps officers take action necessary to apprehend offenders and to prevent recurrence.

He pointed out that names of minors involved and their parents are not used by the press and TV except in emergencies of abduction and murder. Reluctance in reporting thwarts police action and also hinders the true total of these incidents.

Last year the State Police investigated 520 sex offense complaints, which include child molestation.

As in other years complaints were most numerous in summer. August was high with 91, July next with 82 and June third with 52. May and October had 50 each while April and September each had 47. The first five months had totals under 50.

SERGEANT FLOEHIN suggested that parents instruct their children to follow these rules:

1. Don't go for rides or walks with strangers and avoid being tempted to do so by candy or money offered by them.

2. Have companions with you when you play outdoors and if possible when going to and from school, shopping errands and to the movies and carnivals. Avoid playing in isolated areas and vacant buildings.

3. Don't loiter in or near public rest rooms as these can be danger spots.

4. Report to your parents, police or teacher anyone who tries to get you to break these rules or when you have any question concerning your safety.

SERGEANT FLOEHIN added that children can help curb molesting incidents by remembering features about suspected sexual molesters, such as approximate height, weight, age, color of eyes, skin and hair and unusual things such as a mustache, tattoos, jewelry scars and physical defects. If there is a car involved, details about it also should be memorized or marked down somehow.

Harry Lapham Marks 15th Yr. with Bank

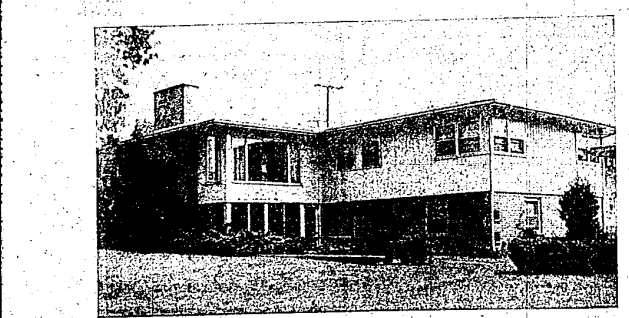
Harry Lapham, vice president of The National Bank of Detroit Farmington Office, this week observed his 15-year anniversary with the local bank.
