Creative Drama Class Signups Begin Monday

Students interested in participating in the world of make believe, drama, and artistic and creative self-expression are invited to enroll in the courses of Creative Drama offered by the Farmington Public Schools as part of the Summer School schedule of courses.

The courses will be conducted in the Farmington Junior High School at 33000 Thomas Street, and will be offered to students in grades 3 through 9.

Taught by Judith A. Rohm, director of Speech Arts at North Farmington High School, the course will be conducted in two divisions — the elementary division made up of students in grades 3 through 6, and the junior high division made up of students in grades 7 through 9.

Classes are designed to motivate students to polish their communication skills and to share their imaginations. The main objectives are to activate each student, bring out his creativity and help him develop confidence in his oral skills. Classes will be held each morning, Monday through Friday, commencing on June 16 and continuing through June 21.

HIGHLIGHTING the summer work in these courses will be the presentations of two plays as a final end stage. The plays will be given on the Farmington Junior High stage.

Students participating in the elementary division will present Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs in musical form. Musical accompaniment will be provided by students from the elementary summer school band classes.

The junior high division will present the Mark Twain story, "Tom Sawyer."

Registration for Summer Creative Drama classes begins Monday, June 8, and will continue through Monday, June 15. Hours for registration are from 12:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. daily, Monday through Friday. On Saturday, June 13, the hours will be from 9 a.m. to noon.

The deadline for registration will be Monday, June 15, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Chosen for Summer Program By Nat'l Science Foundation

James R. Dulzo, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Dulzo of 33000 Thomas Street in Farmington, who consecutive year, is being held will be a junior at the University of Detroit High School next fall, has received a National Science Foundation award to attend the Summer Mathematics Program for High Ability Secondary School Students at Assumption College, Worcester, Massachusetts.
