

## Men's Slow-Pitch Softball League Now Being Formed

Charles Shandor, director of the Farmington Area Recreation Commission, announced this week that a men's softball league is being formed in the community and will seek use of the lighted baseball diamond in the City Park for one and possibly two nights each week, depending on the amount of response to the program.

Shandor said his committee is planning to hold a meeting for the purpose of forming a slow-pitch softball league on Monday night, June 8, at 8 p.m. in the Farmington Junior High School cafeteria. He urged all men interested in joining, such as a league to attend the Monday night meeting.

There are only two nights, Tuesdays and Fridays, still not scheduled for use of the lighted diamond. The proposed slow-pitch league is expected to make a bid for a regular weekly spot on the lighted diamond schedule at the next meeting of the City Council, June 15.

SHANDOR REPORTED his FARC office has received many telephone calls from men interested in forming such a league and seeking his help in its formation.

Due to the need for immediate action for getting the proposed league under way, Shandor asked all interested persons to contact his office at GR. 6-1702 if they are unable to attend the Monday night meeting. He said registration for this year's participation in the league has already progressed to the point where at least a six-team league can be assured.

All indications point to at least the addition of several other teams which it is hoped can be organized at the June 8 meeting.

## American Legion Baseball Tryouts to be Held Tonight

Another season of American Legion Baseball is just around the corner as hopefuls from three area high schools will tryout for positions on the Groves-Walker Post 346 team tonight (Thursday, June 4) beginning at 6:30 p.m. on the Our Lady of Sorrows High School baseball diamond, Ten Mile at Power Road.

Manager of the Farmington American Legion team, Wally Christiansen, reported this week that this year's team has a total of ten returning veterans.

DUE BACK for another year of Legion baseball are Chuck Viane, John Kraft, Lee Marthia, Bill Oldershaw, all of North Farmington High School; Dick Johnston, Bill Freeman and Jim Stevenson, all of Farmington High School; and Rick Goyt, Tom Cunnillo and Brian Benner, all of Our Lady of Sorrows High School.

A new coach will be joining in this year's efforts for a run at the District 18 Championship. The new Farmington coach will be Richard Tyler, who coached the Farmington High School baseball team to

the Inter-Lakes Conference championship three years ago. TYLER WILL JOIN with Dick Thiesen to round out manager Christiansen's coaching staff.

There are presently 23 boys out for the American Legion baseball team. The first action this year is scheduled for Sunday, June 14, when the Groves-Walker Post team will play the team with Post 346.

The Farmington J.V. baseball team won two games last week to end their season record at four wins and five losses.

Against rival North Farmington, the little Falcons white washed Raider pitchers as they collected 12 hits and 8 walks in winning 14 to 3.

Glen Lindsay pounded out hits including a 2-run homer. Falcon pitcher John Winder threw a beautiful one hitter. He struck out 12 and walked 10.

IN A HITTING COMEBACK Thursday against Walsted Lake, the Falcons edged out a 11 to 10 victory.

The Falcons had a 7 to 9 lead going into the bottom of the sixth. But the Walsted Lake team finally got to pitcher Al Klais and bombed out 5 hits in a row.

The Falcons had a 7 to 5 lead in the seventh. The little Falcons scored 4 times to almost put the game away, as Ron Lee walked; Eric Erickson, Mike Smerly and Bill Pell singled, and Tom Donoghue doubled.

In the bottom of the 7th, the Falcons had a 6-run lead, but the tide was sure to change after 3 singles, an error, and a home run.

Starter Al Klais was relieved by Dick Johnston, who threw a straight ball. With 1 out and 2 runners on, Tom Donoghue came into pitch; the first batter singled, and the ball went right through the center-fielders legs. The next batter walked to load the bases with 1 out; the tying run on third,

the winning run on second.

DONOGHUE BORE down and struck out the next batter. The final batter grounded out to Dick Johnston to end the game. Al Klais received the victory. The JV squad had a successful season, despite a poor start under the coaching of Charley Wubbena.

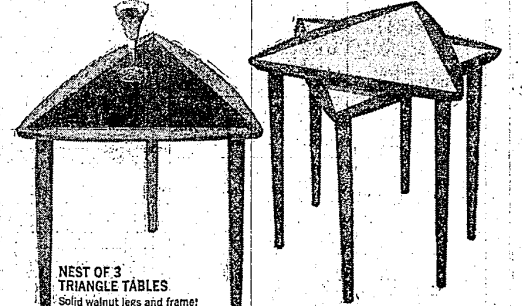

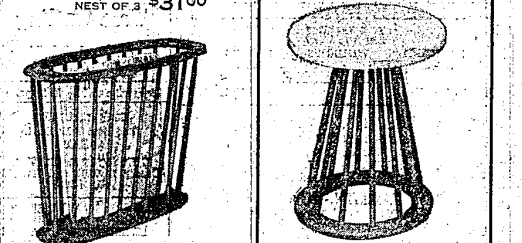
