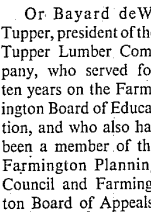

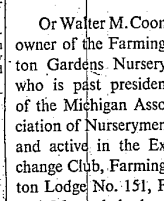
Bayard deW. Tupper

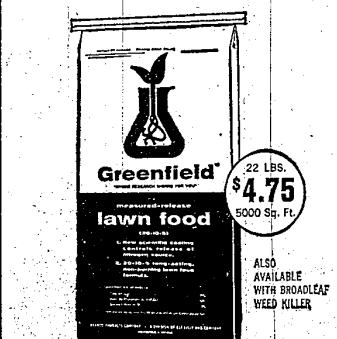

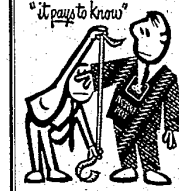

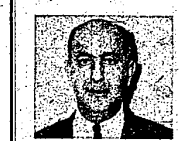
