Killed in 2-Car Crash at Twp's SE Boundary

Farmington Township narrowly missed recording its seventh traffic fatality of 1964 over the weekend as a Livonia youth was killed in a two-car crash at Inkster Road and Eight Mile Road, just over the township's southeast boundary line, in Livonia.

Killed in the accident, which occurred at 12:20 a.m. Sunday, June 7, was Ray Dean Stamper, Jr., 17, of 20221 Angling Road in Livonia. He was alone in his car heading south on Inkster Road and collided with a car driven by June Short, 44, of 2826 Vickburg in Detroit.

Short was not injured but a passenger in his car, Curtis Redford, 47, of 10617 Hobart Court in Ferndale, was taken to Redford Community Hospital with serious injuries.

STAMPER was the son of William Henry Stamper, Sr. and Stella Mae Ashley Stamper of Angling Road. He was born August 1, 1946, and was a junior at Clarenceville High School.

Surviving besides his parents are two sisters, Mrs. Irene Petrosky of Redford Township and Fannie Faye Stamper at home and six brothers, Elmer Stamper of Birmingham, Alabama, Thomas Stamper of Livonia, Henry Stamper, Jr., of Howell, Willard Stamper of Pontiac, Lester Stamper of Howell and Ralph Stamper of Grandon, Wisconsin.

Funeral services were held June 10 from the Spencer J. Heeney Funeral Home in Farmington with the Rev. Curtis Cobb of the Farmington Missionary Baptist Church officiating. Interment was at Oakland Hills Memorial Cemetery in Novi.

Appoint Asst. Principals at 3 Junior Highs

The appointment of three assistant principals for the three junior high schools in the Farmington school system was officially approved by action of the board of education Monday night.

Jan R. Mangon of 28029 Nine Mile, Farmington, will assume duties as assistant principal at Farmington Jr. High.

Married and the father of one child, he was born March 25, 1934.

Concert Band Planned Here

All adult musicians in the Farmington area who play band instruments are invited to participate in the community concert band which will begin rehearsals at Farmington Senior High School on Monday evening, June 15.

This band, which will fill the often spoken need for an opportunity for adults to play the instruments which they learned while in school, will be made up of high school and adult musicians who have a desire to be creative and perform good music. A SUMMER BAND composed mostly of high school students has been in operation in Farmington for many years. Given enough young adults may not have been active musicians for a while, they are encouraged to "dust off" their instruments and come out and join the group. There will be no auditions required for participation in the band.

For those who play, but do not have an instrument, there is a limited number of instruments available.

The proposed schedule for the group includes three outdoor concerts which will be performed at different locations in the community.

The Board approved the request, subject to the Township Police Department's authorization. As planned, the cannon will be fired into a 30-foot clay bank on the Star Cutter property near Gill Road and Grand River Avenue.

The cannon will be fired for an hour, beginning at 6 p.m. next Tuesday.

Few Teachers to Get More Pay

An additional step will be added on the pay schedule for teachers in the Farmington School District who have taken a substantial amount of training beyond their master's degree requirements as a result of official action taken by the board of education at its regular meeting Monday night.

Teachers who have completed approximately one more year of educational training beyond their master's degree and are qualified as educational specialists will be granted additional pay beyond what they would normally get for a master's degree only.

How much higher the increment will be for those with educational specialist degrees as yet to be determined but Superintendent G. V. Harrison said that it would probably be about the same as the increment between those with bachelors and those with master's degrees.

The board has had under consideration for some time now a method of rewarding those teachers who continue to broaden themselves in their own fields but, up until now, had not found it financially possible to do so.

The vote was unanimous in favor of establishing another salary plateau on the present salary schedule for those qualifying as educational specialists.

It was indicated that at some future date another still higher pay limit might be set for those going on to earn doctor's degrees.

Gunman Robs. Mkt. Customer

William Kuebler, 66, of 19151 Main, before surrendering his Indian in Detroit was held up and robbed June 5 while in the Main Market at 29650 Grand River Avenue in Farmington Township. The hold-up occurred at 1:03 a.m. on June 5.

The hold-up man, brandishing a chrome-plated revolver, ordered Kuebler to hand over his wallet containing \$32. Thinking it was a joke, Kuebler was struck in the back by the gunman.

The hold-up man fled on foot from the store without attempting to get further money from the cash register or the owner. Township Police have a good suspect and are hopeful of a quick arrest.

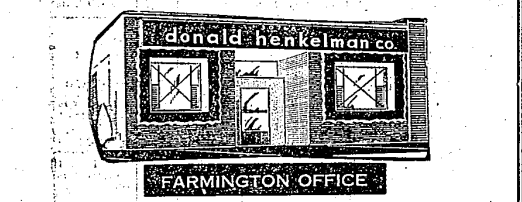

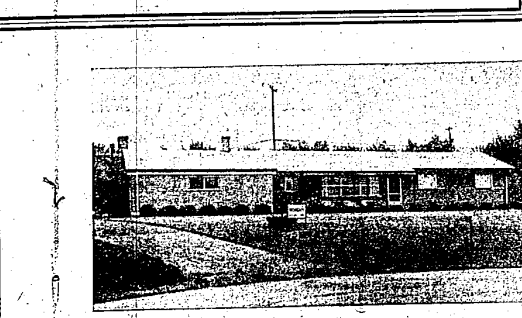

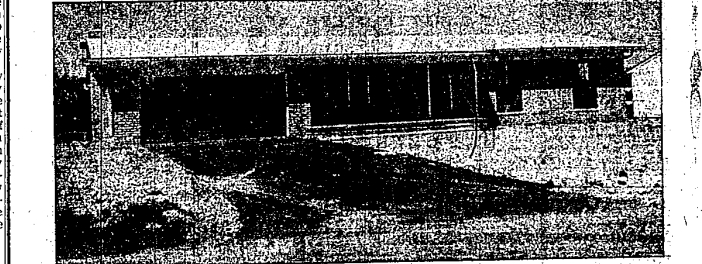
