**JC Bike Rodeo Slated June 15**

Approximately 300 Farmington City and Township youngsters are expected to wheel their bicycles through a fast driving course, submit them to a safety inspection and have their markings with reflective tape during the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce Bicycle Rodeo to be held this Saturday, June 13 at 10 a.m. at the Farmington Junior High School parking lot on Thomas Street.

Don Niehaus and Don Koban, Bike Rodeo Chairmen, said the bicycle safety committee responsible for the program has stocked enough reflective tape to mark the bicycles of all the school-age cyclists in the community who participate.

**THE JAYCEES WILL** place markings of reflective tape on the handlebars and forks of bicycles of the rodeo participants and strips of brightly reflective tape on the rear fenders to enable motorists to see bicyclists at night from distances as far away as 2,500 feet. The tape glows brightly in automobile headlights beams.

Farmington Police Chief Maurice Polz will be on hand to advise the contestants of Bicycle Safety Rules. If desired at that time, contestants can also purchase their annual City Bicycle licenses.

Contestants in the competitive events will compete against children in their own age group and trophies will be awarded to the various winners as well as a trophy for the best decorated bicycle in the group. All contestants will receive free soft drinks and refreshments.
