More Than 600 Here Receive Safety-Checks

More than 600 Farmington area motorists availed themselves of the two-day Vehicle Safety Check program staged in the community last month, it was announced by general chairman Russ Gilbert this week.

Gilbert praised the cooperation given by the area gasoline retailers, car dealers, service clubs and Boy Scouts in making the first such program so successful.

"In spite of the fact we were hampered by bad weather which necessitated splitting the two days originally planned for the safety-checks," Gilbert said, "the response to the program was most gratifying and virtually assures that this will become an annual event."

GILBERT POINTED to the results of the local safety-checks, which have been forwarded to the Auto Industries Highway Safety Committee in Washington, D.C., to be added to reports from all over the nation, to show the merit of the program. "It is interesting to note," he said, "that so many of the persons who were told to get their vehicles checked returned after having it repaired to pass inspection and receive the Safety-Check windshield sticker."

It was also pointed out by Gilbert that Safety-Check stickers were given to each of the participating mechanics, and dealers to provide for motorists who come into their places of business requesting a free inspection of their vehicle.

the purchase of a little more kitchen equipment this present kitchen would be satisfactory as a central kitchen site. There would be some problems to be worked out, however, it was emphasized.

She also gave some estimated costs on what would be needed to provide for a central kitchen at a new school site location.

Based on the estimated costs between the two proposals the board decided that it would be better to construct and equip a new central kitchen facility at the next new elementary school to be put under construction between Middlebelt and Orchard Lake roads a short distance south of Ten Mile Road.

The board authorized the administration to have the architectural firm of Lynn Smith & Associates include in their plans a central kitchen facility for the satellite feeding program proposed. The board also asked the administration to investigate the possibility of a central food storage setup at the central kitchen location.

tion of some length." He felt the board should continue following the present policy of hiring policemen according to their qualifications.

SUPERVISOR HALL said the matter of an applicant's residence should not disqualify him from being hired by the township. He pointed out in some cases, under such a policy, it would amount to imposing a hardship on a prospective officer to sell his home in order to relocate in the township. He further expressed the feeling that in such cases where a new police officer had any distance to travel to work the matter of time and convenience would have to be taken into consideration without a stipulation from the board calling for a hard and fast residence requirement.

"The examination prepared by the township for police officer applicants is the best we've ever had," Hall said. He was supported by the board to continue the policy already established for hiring new police officers.

Only 133 Pints In Blood Bank

A final report given on the recently held Farmington Community Blood Bank revealed that while a total of 19 pints had been donated only 133 were left to carry on with until the next bank after all accounts were settled.

It was explained that some of the blood donated was actually given to replace blood used by families earlier and that additional pints had to be used to replace advances of blood made to the Farmington bank from other banks after the local bank was completely exhausted its supply.

Local blood bank officials questioned strongly whether or not the remaining 133 pints would be enough to carry the Farmington bank through until its next regularly scheduled date for an appeal for donors community-wide.
