Construction of Twp. **Water Lines Halted** By Workmen's Strike

Work on water transmission and distribution lines into the seven special assessment water districts in Farmington Township is now at a standstill.

Work has been at a halt since Monday, June 8, when members of the underground construction workers union throughout the state went out on strike. 
