Jehovah's Witnesses Hold 3-Day Meeting

Witnesses from the Farmington congregations have just returned from their three-day meeting held at the Farmington Senior High School where they heard Mr. J. W. Wilson, District Minister, stating in his discourse that "Four years ago the head of the P.U.I. announced that in the decade then past, crime increased four times as fast as our expanding population." He said, "We are confronted with the worst era of lawlessness in the Nation's history."

Understandably then, youth and older persons need assistance in successfully facing up to the urgency of our troubled times! There is a solidly united body of Christian people who, on a global scale, are winning out over these pressures and are living their faith. Their stability for Christian principles is exemplary encouragement for others. For our benefit, let us hear what they've learned about the best ways to combat the pressures from a corrupt world and understand how to hold the course that leads to everlasting life in the centuries ahead.

AT A BAPTISMAL ceremony Saturday afternoon, 30 persons were baptized in water as a symbol of their dedication to God by the official journal of the preaching fellowship of Jehovah's Witnesses.

More than one million Jehovah's witnesses are active in 245 lands. The official journal, "The Watchtower," is published in 62 languages.

Over 1,900 delegates attended the assembly from 18 congregations in southern Michigan, including Detroit, Dearborn, Farmington, Wayne, Inkster and surrounding areas. The community will benefit from this assembly in the forthcoming months. During the remainder of this month Jehovah's witnesses will call on the heads of the people with the "New World Translation of The Holy Bible" calling attention to God's promises of restoring the earth to "Paradise" condition in this generation, according to Arthur Zacharak, presiding minister of the Farmington congregation. All in attendance were invited to study the Bible with Jehovah's Witnesses and learn God's will.
