Civil War Cannon Booms In Farmington on June 16

A Civil War cannon boomed in Farmington, probably for the first time, on Tuesday evening, June 16, as the eight-man artillery crew from the local chapter of the North-South Scrimmage Association which practiced for an upcoming exhibition at Greenfield Village by shooting at a target placed in a sand bank on the Star Cutter property in the township.

Sgt. Major Fred Kaiser, whose grandfather fought in the Civil War, is in charge of the eight-man artillery crew which uses a bronze six-pounder, complete with all the necessary apparatus and equipment.

Kaiser has a brother, Carl who is the Ordnance Sgt. and two sons, Gary, 10, and Alex, 12, also serving in the artillery crew with him. Most of the crew members are descendants of Civil War soldiers.

THE CANNON has been refurbished from the original piece of ordnance used by the Loomis Battery, formed by Cyrus Loomis in Coldwater, Michigan in 1861, which later fought in the battle of Perryville, Kentucky.

The six-pound cannon, itself, however, did not serve with the Michigan artillery forces. Ironically enough, the cannon is a Confederate one which was captured in Vicksburg, a leading manufacturer of southern arms early in the war, until its capture by General U.S. Grant in 1863.

The more than 2,000 members of the North-South Scrimmage Association, consisting of ex-soldiers and descendants, around the country to commemorate the war between the states. The local group delighted youngsters who were attracted by the spectacle and was heard for some distance and lasted about an hour. Actually, the cannon was loaded 24, also serving in the artillery charge it normally would have carried under combat conditions.
