

## Republican James Dickerson Seeking Congressional Seat

James Dickerson today reaffirmed his candidacy for the Republican nomination to Congress from the 19th District.

"We've maintained headquarters in Pontiac since May 1 and have staffed it on a full-time basis," Dickerson said, "and we're in this to stay."

John Kamego, currently on leave from the Pontiac office of Michigan Bell Telephone, is serving as Dickerson's campaign chairman. Kamego, 40, was a community relations specialist with Michigan Bell, and is a Naval Reserve officer.

Official Dickerson for Congress headquarters are in Pontiac at 110 West Huron in the National Building, and are open daily.

IN COMMENTING on the new district, which includes northern and western Oakland County, plus Livonia, Redford and Northville in Wayne County, Dickerson said, "In its present form the District is as challenging as any in the nation. Campaigning through the area will of necessity be rigorous and demanding, because of the large area and its diverse cross-sections of people and industries."

"In addition, we'll have to remind voters in Wayne County that Martha Griffiths, presently 17th District Congresswoman, is running in the 19th District, and similarly remind Oakland County voters that Bill Broomfield will be running in the 18th District."

## Name Director Of Republican Finance Drive

Mrs. Ray (June) Baker, 3218 Grand River, Farmington, has been named as the second Legislative District Chairman of the Republican Party's Neighbor to Neighbor Finance Drive for the 1964 campaign.

Appointed by Mr. Allen A. Strom, county-wide Chairman of the Drive, Mrs. Baker will be responsible for organizing and directing the volunteers who will canvass this district for funds to help support the Party's activities.

## Petitioning for Nov. 3 Vote on "Mass. Ballot"

One-fourth of the 20,000 eligibles needed to meet Oak and County's quota for the Massachusetts Ballot petition drive have been obtained in the first week of the drive, announced County Drive Chairman William A. O'Brien Friday.

"Five thousand registered voters already have signed petitions calling for a 'Vote November 3' on the 'ignominious' issue of whether Michigan should adopt the legislature-passed Massachusetts Ballot which allows voting separately for each office or simply for the present Michigan Ballot which allows for straight-party voting by pulling one lever."

The state-wide petition drive officially was kicked off June 15.

O'Brien said both Democrats and Republicans in Oakland County are signing the petition.

"Massachusetts at the present time is the most politically corrupt state in the United States," the friends of good government in this state are fighting to abolish the voting device that the Republicans would insist upon us here in Michigan. O'Brien stated, "Other states in enjoying honest government under both parties and I believe this is primarily due to forces of party responsibility. Party responsibility for its candidates would be completely destroyed by the Massachusetts Ballot."

"This type ballot creates mass confusion at the polls," O'Brien stated, "other states that use this ballot allow five minutes for casting your vote while Michigan would allow only three minutes to vote. All other states that use this ballot have fewer offices to vote for (fifteen in Massachusetts as compared to 45 to 57 in Oakland County)."

"In order to prevent long lines, election officials in Oakland County would have to spend over \$600,000 to add additional voting machines," O'Brien went on.

Michigan ranks second in the production of plums and blueberries, third in apples, asparagus for processing, celery and green beans, fourth in cauliflower, grapes, onions, peaches, pears, red beets, strawberries, sweet cherries and fresh market tomatoes; fifth in fresh market asparagus, butter, carrots, green lima beans and pepper bell peppers. In total value, Michigan produces more than \$100 million worth of fresh market produce. Michigan is also a leading producer of such crops as alfalfa, soybeans, corn, wheat, and other grains.

## Congressman W. Broomfield To Run in 18th

Congressman William S. Broomfield announced today he will seek a fifth term in the U.S. House of Representatives. The Royal Oak (Michigan) Republican said he will run in the new 18th district created by the Michigan Legislature on May 22.

It will be the largest Congressional district in population in Michigan with 417,174 residents. A RANKING member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, Broomfield said he will continue his campaign for "efficiency, economy and freedom."

He has urged a firmer foreign policy in Southeast Asia and an end to foreign aid to such pro-Red countries as Indonesia. Broomfield said nominating petitions are now being circulated in his behalf in the new district which includes the east side of Oakland County.

BROOMFIELD is in his eighth year of Congressional service. He is the ranking minority member of the Far East and National Security Subcommittee and a member of the African Affairs Subcommittee of the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

He also served two years in the Michigan Senate and six in the Michigan Legislature. Broomfield is the youngest speaker pro tem in the state's history.

Broomfield's present Congressional district encompasses all of Oakland County and is one of the ten largest in population in the nation with 600,603 residents.

An earlier redistricting plan adopted by the State Legislature last year was recently declared invalid by the courts. The new Eighteenth District includes the following townships and cities: (Townships) Addison, Avon, Bloomfield, Oakland, Pontiac, Royal Oak and Southfield. (Cities) Berkeley, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Clawson, Ferndale, Hazel Park, Huntington Woods, Lathrup Village, Madison Heights, Oak Park, Pleasant Ridge, Royal Oak, Southfield and Troy.
