To see that this is done, the governor for the second year has personally appointed the Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y Clubs of Michigan to take the leadership in a special campaign to "Let Freedom Ring." Rich Hoffman, Hallett, high school junior and president of the State Hi-Y Council is the state chairman. The state has been divided into regions with chairmen busy at securing local committees and seeking the assistance of organizations and individuals.

All churches, ministers, and interested groups are encouraged to participate, to delegate one or two persons to ring their church bells for four minutes beginning at 1 p.m. on the Fourth.
