City Tax Bills Have Gone Out: Total \$275.215

The iotal city tax billing this year was \$275,215.41 which is an increase of approximately \$15,000 over the city tax billing \$200,333.78. The tax rate remains the

S200,333.78. The tax rate remains the same as last year at \$11.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. All of the increase in the lo-tal hilling is the result of an in-crease in the essessed valua-tion of property in the city due to new construction and re-modeling done. THE REAL property value in the city this year has been set at \$20,27,50 which is an in-crease in the assessed valua-tion of real property over last
