The best man was Roy Jordan. Ushers were Gary Mordello, Dennis Lange and Jim Leach.


The bride attended Henry Ford Community College. The bridegroom attended Wayne State University.

# Local Teacher Retires to End 48-Year Career

A teaching career extending back 48 years came to a close last month as Edith J. Powers retired from the Farmington School District, where she had taught classes for ten of those years.

Mrs. Powers taught elementary students at the Longacre, Gill and Cloverdale schools in Farmington. She will be 68 years of age September 23.

The extensive career which came to a close at the end of the school year, just completed in Farmington has been briefly summarized by Mrs. Powers' friends.

MRS. POWERS was born in Dalton, Barry County, Michigan in 1896. She graduated from the Hastings, Michigan High School and attended Barry County Normal College (1915-1916).

She received her three-year certificate and her new teaching license from the Michigan State Teachers College (1924-25). Returning to Michigan, she taught at the Western Michigan University (1925-30) at which time she received her Life Certificate. She returned again to Western Michigan University (1934-40) and received her Bachelor of Science Degree in 1940.

She started her teaching career in the rural school of Belmont and Cloverdale, Barry County, in 1916, teaching all 6 grades and continued there until 1922.

In 1922 she transferred to the Belmont and Cloverdale schools again teaching all 8 grades and stayed there until 1937.

From 1937-1940, she taught all 8 grades at the Gibson School in Saginaw, Michigan; from 1940-1942 she taught at the Hart School, all 8 grades, in Oshtemo, Michigan; from 1942-1946 she taught all 8 grades at the Grand Rapids School in Grand Rapids, Michigan; from 1946-1948 she taught 5th and 6th grades at the Hopkins Rural Agricultural School in Hopkins, Michigan; and from 1948-1954 she taught at the Caledonia Rural Agricultural Schools in Caledonia, Michigan, teaching 5th grade first, then the sixth and once again the 5th grade.

IN 1954 SHE came to Farmington, going to Gill Road School. In 1958 she transferred to Cloverdale School, teaching 5th grade and in 1961 she went to the Longacre School, teaching 5th grade.

During her teaching career she continued her studies at Wayne State University and received her Masters degree in 1957.

MRS. POWERS, while in college, 1922-1930, kept store at Cloverdale, Michigan, drove 23 miles to and from school and had three children to look after when she got home.

During vacation 1932-1934 she cooked in a restaurant in Allegan and Oshtemo to help pay her children's through high school. During 1931-1932 she also worked at the Brower Convalescent Home in Plainfield, Michigan.

She paid her own way, even through high school.

Mrs. Powers traveled on a conducted tour of Europe with the NEA. She went through England, Holland, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Italy and France and has colored slides of her travels.

In 1954 when she came to Farmington her records indicate she was a widow with two children.
