Kendallwood Kommments

The three Kendallwood prize winners, the Thompson-Brown sponsored Christmas lighting and decorating of home displays, judged by George Kuster and John Giesmer, were:

A floor polisher for the first award given to Domenic Yacobi, 28122 Kirkside, K-2. The decorating consisted of two artificial Christmas tree plants in gold pots at either side of the door, with a rose-colored metallic ribbon tied in a bow. Two angels swinging from bells and a horn-of-plenty decorated the door. The outline of the house was done with cedar roping and blue lights.

Four trees with blue lights were against the house and two white lighted trees were at either end of the house. Miniature multi-colored lights were strung on two trees nearest the door. Near the garage area, there were two green lighted wreaths and lighted candles. Coachman lantern at the drive entrance was entwined with cedar roping and blue lights. Red and white spotlights did their bit to add to the festively decorated home.

THE SECOND AWARD was a Westinghouse Transistor Radio given to Calvin Opperhauser of 28111 Ridgebrook, K-2. A giant frame of a Christmas tree outlined the entrance of the door, sprinkled with multi-colored miniature lights. Four smaller outlines of Christmas trees against the house, were covered with colored miniature lights also.

Large growing shrub at the end of the house was covered with miniature lights and the two smaller shrubs at either end of the garage door were entwined with miniature lights.

Two red lighted wreaths and a center green lighted wreath hung above the garage front. A frosted della robia wreath hung at the front door which was visible by indirect lighting.

A stained-glass type religious scene was in the front window. The coachman lantern at the end of the drive was entwined with cedar roping and miniature lights and small bushes beside either side of the drive also had miniature lights. Most of the lighting was done with multi-colored miniature lights.

THE THIRD AWARD was a seven-bush cordless toothbrush given to C. D. Valerius, 28319 Brandywine of K-3.

A large cone wreath decorated the door and a white artificial Christmas tree with white lights gleamed through the picture window. Groupings of lighted candles were visible through two front windows. Wood figure of Santa, outlined with Christmas lights, was near the front door. A spot-lighted scene of old-fashioned carolers was set on the lawn at the far end of the house. The house was outlined in multi-colored lights. The double garage door was done up to resemble a package.

Red ribbon about a foot wide was placed across the door and tied in the center with a huge bow. A greeting hung from the bow with the wording "MERRY CHRISTMAS FROM ALL OF US, C. D. Valerius."

The coachman lantern at the front of the drive was done up with red ribbon bows and colored lights.

I would like to describe another unusually decorated home, that fascinated us while we were touring through the area viewing the beautiful decorations.

IT IS THE HOME of Robert B. Johnson of 32381 Redstone, done in a modern theme and very unusual. The white house was outlined in green Christmas lights. At the black door hung two sets of three gold bells each, tied with gold tinsel ribbon that glittered when moved by the gentle winds of the evening.

At the picture window, a modern octagon-shaped tree of gold lights revolved and was illuminated by changing colored spotlights. At the double garage door on black background, a large bell was placed which also was of the gold glitter and spotlighted.
