## Condemnation Action May Be Taken by City

Strong indications were given Monday night that the City Council may start condemnation proceedings if necessary to acquire the residential home and property located at the southeast corner of Grand River Avenue and Liberty Street.

The second of the two homes located at this corner in the business section had directly north of the new City municipal building is already owned by the City.

Acquisition of the home and property on the corner there has been discussed intermittently by the Council for some time now. Long range plans call for demolition of the two older homes at this corner and possibly even development of a community center building at this location at some future date.

**CITY MANAGER** John Dinan reported to the Council Monday night that he feels that the amount being asked for this property on the corner by the trust department of the National Bank of Detroit representing the Howard M. Warner Estate is unreasonable. They want \$17,500 for the 1,750 square foot parcel which is equivalent to \$2.33 per square foot, he said.

The City's offer of \$2,000 for the property was rejected.

## Beautification Comm. Forming

A special Beautification Committee, the Wayne, Oakland and Macomb county area was formed recently and the City of Farmington along with other communities in this three county area has been invited to have representation in the group.

The purpose of the committee is stated by its vice chairman in a letter to the City Council, is to sponsor anti-litter and beautification programs for the whole area and also to assist member communities in carrying out their own specific programs.

At the regular Council meeting Monday, City Manager John Dinan announced the committee indicated that they felt that a committee such as this could be beneficial to all communities.

No action was taken to appoint a representative from the City to this committee to attend a meeting slated for early this year and further meetings but it was indicated that this action would be taken at the next regular Council meeting on January 20.

Mayor Robert Lindbert suggested that the Farmington Garden, Club, Business & Professional Women's Club and other groups might also be asked to see if they would like to name a representative or representatives to serve on this committee.

## Two Hearings Not Required

The somewhat perplexing problem as to whether public hearings on rezoning requests should be held before both the Planning Commission and City Council itself still seems to be unsettled. At least one hearing, officials have an opinion from a City Attorney Robert Kelly to guide them.

Kelly's opinion, as requested by the Council, was given Monday night.

He pointed out that a hearing before the planning body was definitely not legally required but that the state statutes were clear in stating that official public hearings did have to be held before the official governing body, a community before any rezoning could be approved.

Kelly also pointed out that the City Code does state that rezoning matters should first go to the Planning Commission for consideration and a recommendation but that it is not specified that the commission must hold any hearing to help formulate their opinions.

If the Council decides against rezoning a parcel it can also take the matter to a rezoning hearing, Kelly indicated.

## Council Unanimously Denies Re-zoning for Apts; Start Need Study

By a unanimous vote of the City Council Monday night, the request for the re-zoning of a ten-acre parcel of land east of Farmington Road and south of Nine Mile to permit the development of another 160-apartment units in the City was denied.

The matter was first discussed at public hearings before both the Planning Commission and Council earlier, there was no further discussion on the re-zoning request at Monday night's meeting.

## Okay Transfer Of City Water, Sewer Accounts

Transfer of the City of Farmington's water and sewer system banking accounts to the Metropolitan National Bank of Farmington was officially approved by action of the City Council at its regular meeting Monday night.

Shortly after this local banking institution was opened, a little over a year ago to become the second bank within the boundaries of the City of Farmington, shifting of some City business to the new bank began during the past year the matter has come up for discussion among City officials.

AT A MEETING in December, the Council gave City Manager John Dinan specific instructions to determine, in consultation with Treasurer Kathryn Cotter, what business might best be able to be transferred to Metropolitan Bank from the Farmington Branch of National Bank of Detroit, which presently handles all the City's accounts.

Treasurer Cotter and Manager Dinan both felt that since the water and sewer accounts were entirely separate from all other general accounts they could be most easily transferred without any difficulties.

The suggestion that Metropolitan Bank also be designated as an official agency for collecting water bills for the City was not favored by the treasurer's office, however.

## Still Lot of Tax Bills Out; Deadline Nears

The deadline for paying 1963 school, county and township tax bills without penalty is now drawing near and there are still an awful lot of bills yet to be paid and particularly in the Township.

This was the word received from the treasurers' offices in the City and Township on Tuesday.

Township Treasurer Elise Avery reported that only a little over \$1 million had come in as of Tuesday against a total billing of almost 7 million.

Based on a total voter registration of 4,822, it was a poor voter turnout of only slightly over 15 per cent.

The newly approved bond issue will require no increase in the present total school tax rate for the school district.

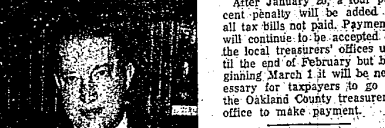
## C'ville Bond Issue Carries

## Want Answer On DSR Buses

Concern was expressed by some members of the City Council over the fact that getting DSR bus service extended to Farmington seems to be at a standstill.

Promises to extend service some months back should either be fulfilled or, at least some indication given by the DSR as to when they will be able to offer service to the community, councilmen felt.

City Manager John Dinan stated that the last word he had from DSR officials was that they would be able to extend facilities here unless or until they were able to find a parking area where their cars could leave their care on a daily basis.

He was asked by the Council to contact DSR officials again and see what was being done to obtain this parking property.
