Mr. Cameron was born May 1914, in Decker, Michigan, the son of Hector and Mabel L. Cameron. He attended school in Decker and on May 9, 1937, was united in marriage to Gladys Holly.

MR. CAMERON was President of the Dan Dee Equipment Manufacturing Company in Detroit. He had lived in Farmington for the past two years coming here from Detroit.

Funeral services took place on Thursday at 2 p.m. from the Thayer Funeral Home with Rev. Kenneth Johnson of the Christian Missionary Alliance of Port Huron officiating. Interment was in Oakland Hills Memorial Cemetery.
