Wintery Cold Can Bring More Problem Ills
Cold, wintery weather greatly viruses responsible for acute year since 1948. This rise, authorities state, increases health problems, according to medical statistics. AND RECENT studies show that only 11 different viruses or families of viruses are responsible to other ailments.

It is well known that a cut in respiratory infections increase during autumn and winter count for about 40 per cent of months, particularly among infants, children, and older or debilitated persons, the current issue of Therapeutic Notes, a medical journal published by Parke, Davis & Company, states.

Fortunately, remarkable progress has been made during the past few years in medical research on vaccines which offer protection against some of the most dangerous viruses. However, deaths from pneumonia, which decreased drastically after the development of sulfa and antibiotic drugs, have shown a rise in recent years, the journal points out.

Between 1957 and 1960 the annual death rate from pneumonia was higher than for any other cause of death. This is no instance like that of the heart.
