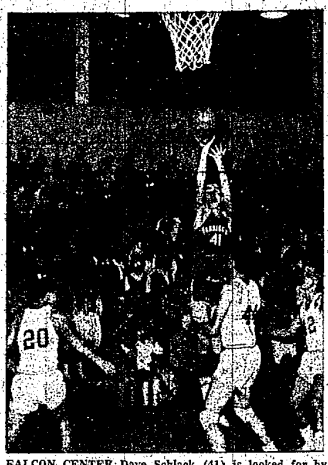

**Falcon Cagers Bidding To Spoil Huskie Record**

The Farmington High School basketball team is leveling its guns on the defending Inter-Lakes Conference Champions this week as the pivotal game with Pontiac Northern in the Falcon gym will take place Friday night, January 10.  
Coach Quiggle's Falcons have a 14 record so far in league action and are hopeful of upsetting the front-running Huskies who are tied with Southfield, each with identical 26 Conference marks.  
REASON FOR optimism on the part of the Falcons stems from recent performances of the hardwoods in which the point-guards shared top honors in game production, with most all of coach Quiggle's key players figuring in high scoring efforts.  
Characteristic of the Falcons' play so far this season (they have a 3-5 overall record) has been strong rebounding under the boards with the forwards led by Reggie Bob Lorenz. And in last Saturday's Detroit News they have an idea how menacing he can be under the boards. In last Friday's non-league tilt at Plymouth, the Falcons' rebounding was superb, trying for its second win in a row, having beaten Wayne High in their consolation match of the Christmas Tournament, after setbacks at the hands ofrosse Pointe and Highland Park.  
HIGH POINT MAN for Farmington at Plymouth was Neil Warriner with 17 tallies. John Olampani, guard for the Falcons, tipped in 14 points for the runner-up high scoring honors.  
Lorenz has the highest single game point-getting, honors for the Falcons; he sunk 22 baskets in the team's only league triumph, against Waterford.  
Coach Quiggle is counting on stout performances from Dave Schlack, who will start at center for the Falcons against Pontiac Northern, and his other forwards, Greg Wilson and Art Lorenz, also slated to start against the Huskies. Rounding out the first unit Friday night will be guards John Olander and Lloyd Nichols, both juniors who have developed greatly with early-season experience.

**FHS Enrolled In Nat'l Safety Program for '64**

The National Commission on Safety Education, the National Education Association and announced today that Farmington Senior High School is one of nearly 4,000 secondary schools enrolled in the 1963-64 National Student Safety Program.  
Participating schools represent all 50 states and the District of Columbia. The Firestone Tire and Rubber Company and the Ford Fund contribute to the program's operation through financial grants. This represents the sixth year of continuous NSTSP activity.  
THE PROGRAM is designed to aid high schools as they devote their energies toward a critical social concern—the safety and well-being of our citizens. Educators at all levels hail the activity as an outstanding example of involving youth in a serious community endeavor. The National Association of Secondary School Principals includes the NSTSP on its approved list of secondary school activities.  
Program materials are prepared and distributed by the Commission. They include guidelines for student groups and suggest appropriate types of projects and activities. As a result of student-centered efforts many communities are experiencing great, real publicity and installation campaigns. Citizens take note of youth as they survey traffic hazards and congestion. Community-wide vehicle safety checks are conducted in addition to a variety of other activities.  
In the spring, participating schools will submit reports of their activities to the review of educator committees.

**Handball Tourney To Open January 11**

The Metropolitan Detroit four-wall singles handball tournament will be held at the K. of C. Detroit Council No. 300, commencing January 11 and ending January 12.  
Entries to date include Dr. Alvin August and his two sons, Steve, 20, a U. M. pre-medical student, and Larry, 13, a Farmington High School pupil.  
LARRY AUGUST was runner-up in the junior handball tournament last month in Dallas, Texas. With great improvement shown in his recent handball matches, Steve August is mostly feared as the youngster who is able to defeat many of the former champions.  
Dr. John Scopus, present champion, is looking forward to wrapping up his 8th four-wall singles title during the week. Seven former city singles champions are in the fold to try to regain the title once again.

**MSU Wrestling Coach Counts On Dick Cook**

Michigan State sophomore Dick Cook of Farmington is billed by Spartan wrestling coach Grady Peninger as a promising newcomer to his varsity squad.  
The 137-pound Cook, who won numerals with the Spartan wrestling team last year, is slated to fill the shoes of David James, the 137-pounder who finished fourth in the Big Ten for MSU last year, after winning the Collegiate Award for leadership as a senior.  
Cook, while a wrestler at Farmington High School, finished second in the state Class A 127-pound weight division in 1961 and 1962. He is considered State's most capable wrestler in the second weight division, stands 5'10", and is 15 years old.

**Lancer Wrestlers Capture Three First Place Berths**

A delegation of Our Lady of Sorrows wrestlers returned from a Christmas Holiday tournament at Zeeland, Michigan, with fourth place team honors and three individual weight division championships.  
Billed as the tournament of champions, the Zeeland Tourney was staged Friday and Saturday, December 27 and 28, at the All-State Championships from last year's state competition competing from the sixteen schools entered.  
STAN SECOSKY of Our Lady of Sorrows, one of the four defending state champions, achieved a record-breaking straight pins en route to his division championship in the 154-pound weight class. Secosky tied in the balloting for the outstanding wrestler of the tournament honors.  
Lancer wrestling coach Dan Potter had good reason to be proud of the fine showing made by the Lancer matmen who captured 33 team points with their three division champions.  
Earning championships in the tourney along with Secosky were Mike LaFond in the 165-pound weight division and Mark Johnson in the 180-pound weight division.  
LAFOND SCORED two pins and a 9, 2 decision over his opponents en route to the top 160-pound berth.  
Kuzinski, who is seeded number two among the Lancer 154-pounders, wrestled two weight divisions above his own in the Zeeland tourney. Kuzinski scored a pin over his first round opponent and decided his next two foes, 129 and 147-pounders, in the 154-pound weight class. Secosky tied in the balloting for the outstanding wrestler of the tournament honors.  
Johnson scored a 16-0 pinfall over a 210-pounder, beating him 13-0, en route to his fourth place finish.  
Normally a 165-pound wrestler, Johnson faced one opponent in the Zeeland tourney who tipped the scales at 210 pounds.  
PAT DOYLE, the Lancer's 165-pound wrestler, and Jerry Wroblewski, a 120-pounder for OLS, captured the other fourth place berth.  
The Lancers played host to Catholic Central on Tuesday evening, a team that beat them 12-0 in the first wrestling meet ever staged at Our Lady of Sorrows five years ago. Next action for OLS is slated for 7:30 p.m. tonight at Ann Arbor, where they will meet St. Thomas.  
The Lancers will be at home again Monday evening, January 13, for a 7:30 p.m. meet with St. Michael's and on Jan. 16 against Whitmore Lake.

**Start Writers' Workshop from Adult Course**

Formation of the South Oakland County Writers' Workshop marks the second time that the Division of Continuing Education, Oakland University, has had an adult "class that won't quit." The first time was in the winter of 1962, when a class of writers at Oakland University established the Clinton Valley Chapter of the Michigan Archaeological Society.  
The Writers' Workshop has been formed by members of a fall term "Workshop in Fiction Writing" course which ended last month. Membership in the new group is open to all amateur and professional writers in the South Oakland County area.  
AN ORGANIZATIONAL meeting for interested writers will be held Thursday, January 9 at 1 p.m. at the home of Mrs. Lee Reese, 2326 Littlefield, Pontiac. At that meeting consideration will be given to holding meetings twice a month, offering afternoon and evening sessions. This would permit participation on a one-month basis for those unable to attend the daytime sessions.  
Meetings of the Writers' Workshop will be working sessions devoted to the reading and critiquing of original writing brought to the group by its members. Mrs. Priscilla Jackson, who instructed the Oakland class forming the group and has taught creative writing at the Birmingham Community House, feels that the talents of the members of this particular class augur well for the new Writers' Workshop. "There are several extremely promising writers in the founding group who should be able to set a professional standard of writing for the Workshop," Mrs. Jackson, who is a member of the Detroit Women Writers' Club, feels that writers can derive great benefit from mutual criticism and exchange of ideas.  
The Clinton Valley Chapter of the Michigan Archaeological Society, like the Writers' Workshop, was the outgrowth of an Oakland University continuing education class. Now in its second year, the group of amateur archaeologists was formed by 10 students who had taken a course in "American Archaeology for the Amateur" in the Spring of 1962. The group now numbers around 40 members who meet regularly for study and for field trips to excavate promising sites in the Oakland County area.
