GOP Senate Candidate Speaks On Deficit Spending Policy

James F. O'Neill, leading candidate for United States Senate and the only Republican member of the State Board of Education stated this week that inflation, brought on by deficit spending, threatens jobs, education, and all of our national objectives. O'Neill said that inflationary pressures are a real and growing threat to the world markets with the resultant loss of jobs and the undermining of our economy which supports education and all of our national objectives.

O'NEILL SPOKE at the Grand Blanc Rotary Club, Monday, July 20. O'Neill stated that one of the most pressing problems confronting the United States today is the maintenance of a strong and growing non-inflationary economy in the United States. For our economy is the bulwark supporting all of our national and international objectives, including (1) the preservation of our freedoms, (2) the right of self-determination throughout the world, and (3) the preservation of peace.

O'Neill stated that in order to strengthen our economic bulwark that will enable us to accomplish these objectives, we must prevent runaway inflation that wastes away income and forces both the low-income groups and our senior citizens to become wards of the state. We must stop inflation by freeing citizens from having a freedom of choice and forces them to depend on government handouts and directives. This can only lead us toward the danger that Thomas Jefferson warned us of when he said: "To preserve our independence, we must not let our rules lead us with perpetual debt."
