Timely Tips on GARDENING

WILD FLOWERS—Fields and roadsides are now aglow with a rich mélange of wild flowers. Misty blue chrysanthemums and white daisies are the most common. Queen Anne's lace flowers, which run for miles along a sunny highway, yield suddenly to a mass of orange day-lilies that clamber over a steep bank. Here a field is veiled in soft lavender star-blossoms, while nearby another field is as richly patterned as a Persian carpet with bright yellow mustard, purple lythrum, lavender monarda, golden black-eyed susans, white daisies, and orange milkweed.

COUNTRY COUSINS—Many of the flowers that nature has spread so lavishly across the country side are garden "escapes" and their counterparts are still cherished cultivated garden plants. Others are close relatives or "improved" forms that we nurture in our gardens.

The glorious tawny day-lily, *Hemerocallis fulva*, was brought to this country to embellish early Colonial gardens. It found growing conditions to its liking and soon escaped from those early gardens, becoming naturalized. Gradually it spread westward and now in Michigan we regard it as a common wild flower. Some gardeners have recognized it and placed it in the garden along side its more domestic relatives. The lovely yellow *Hemerocallis hyperborea* is a perennial hardy day-lily. The wild bergamot or Monarda was used by the Indians for tea and as an ingredient in a perfume hand dressing. The lavender form, *M. fistulosa*, is most common but the red form, *M. didyma*, (Bea halm or Oswego teal) also grows wild in Michigan, both as a native plant and as an escape. This makes a lovely garden plant, and the compact pink variety, *Croftway Pink*, is especially desirable.

The Board of Education of Farmington Public School District will receive sealed bids for the construction, completion and equipping of the Additions to East Junior High School and North Farmington High School, Oakland County, Michigan, at the office of the Board of Education, 32500 Shawwassee, Farmington, Michigan.

Separate proposals for the following will be received until 8:00 P.M., E.S.T., Wednesday, August 12, 1964, at which time and place all bids will be publicly opened and read aloud:

- BASE BID A - GENERAL CONSTRUCTION
- BASE BID B - MECHANICAL WORK
- BASE BID C - ELECTRICAL WORK
- BASE BID D - SCIENCE EQUIPMENT
- BASE BID E - LIBRARY EQUIPMENT

Proposals must be on forms furnished by the architect and be accompanied by bid bond or certified check in the amount of five per cent (5%) of the proposed submitted.

Michigan Has Record Number Of Public Swimming Pools

There's going to be a lot of season recreation as the grow more water in the Water Won'ting number of indoor swimming pools this year with the building of a record number of by models. The 77 permits issued during the first half of 1964 exceeded the 72 issued in all of 1959. During June, 15 construction permits issued set a new high for that month. In May the 20 permits issued were most for any month since the State Health Department began issuing construction permits for pools in the 1930's. Hodges says that 1,022 construction permits have been issued for public swimming pools in Michigan, most of them in the past 10 years.

Business customers will pay only 4.2 cents (one message unit) for each call to the Detroit portion of the Super Extended Area, regardless of the duration of the call.
