

Bike Rider is 10th Fatality In Twp. Traffic

Farmington Township recorded its tenth traffic fatality of 1964 last Thursday evening, July 16, when a 15-year-old boy on a bicycle was struck by a car on Northwestern Highway just south of 14 Mile Road. The accident happened at 10:04 p.m.

Dead on arrival at William Beaumont Hospital was Ian L. Chambers, who was staying with the Darrell Spencer family of 5516 Northeast Lane in Birmingham. His home is in Connecticut.

According to Farmington Township Police, the boy apparently had been attempting to cross Northwestern Highway from the North-West Lanes when he was struck by the car. The car was driven by Robert Gili of 19300 Margareta Avenue in Detroit. He was driving south on a west on Northwestern Highway.

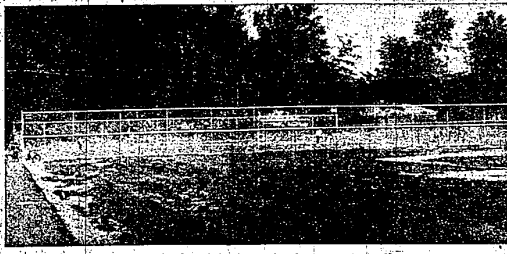

Report on Apt. House Study

questionnaires produced a wide analysis of the average apartment house dweller and was a good cross-section of the existing apartment house occupancy. The survey also indicated the effects apartment dwellers have on a community.

JOHN ALLEN, sub-committee chairman, and Planning Commission Chairman Sandy Brotherton gave a report on the study of development, relative to apartment houses, listing three major categories that were researched. They used technical data developed by the Federal Housing Administration in arriving at improvements in the three areas.

In the first category, site development, Allen and Brotherton utilized a chart that was developed by the F.H.A. at arriving at space requirements, parking, setback requirements, height and density regulations. Covered in the second category researched by Allen and Brotherton were methods to remedy and improve soundproofing, based on the utilization of changes on ceiling and walls, insulation on various plumbing and electrical fixtures and other methods that tend to reduce excessive noise and afford more privacy to the apartment resident.

Fireproofing protection, as recommended by the F.H.A. with the development of certain fireproofing materials was incorporated as the third category of the sub-committee report made by Allen and Brotherton.

It was decided that the three sub-committee chairmen, Selbert, Nelson and Allen, will meet prior to the regular meeting of the City Planning Commission to review their findings in detail and develop conclusions and recommendations for the review of the committee as a whole. The full report will subsequently be forwarded to the Planning Commission upon the approval of the Planning Commission.

Sewer Check Underway Here By County DPW

The Oakland County Department of Public Works has started their inspection of the alternate sanitary sewer line, the Valleyview Drive on July 17. It was learned in a report from the Farmington City Manager, John Dinan, at the regular City Council meeting Monday night, July 19.

The County DPW is using closed circuit television equipment to inspect the line, and as the alternate course for the extension of the ten-inch sewer line which has caused problems in the past, the County of Valleyview where it is reduced to an eight-inch line.

A total of 271 feet of the alternate line has been inspected by the County and found in good condition. The line being inspected has a total length of 800 feet.

The County plans on completing their inspection this week and should be in a position to advise the city on the use of the sewer prior to their regular meeting, Dinan reported.

hundred and forty-seven vehicles had to be towed from the six-month period. In the arrest category, township police arrested 22 persons in connection with traffic accidents.

The largest number of accidents for a single traffic offense, there were 59. Following loss of license in 43 cases, running red lights or flashers was cited in 13 accidents and running stop signs or making improper turns was cited in 21 accidents.

TOWNSHIP POLICE cars traveled 112,723 miles during patrols and carrying out duties for the first half of this year compared with a total of 185,523 miles for all of last year.

In police enforcement cases, the township handled 64 cases of parking and entering 223 (largely) 12 cases of malicious destruction of property, 16 vandalism cases, 15 stolen car reports, 33 missing person reports, 30 dog bites, 44 cases of accidental injury, 4 accidental deaths, 3 rapes, 2 molestations and 6 other sex offenses.

In all of 1963, the township handled 423 cases, 444 malicious destruction of property cases, 133 breaking and entering reports and made a total of 152 arrests.

Twp. Water, Sewer Const. at Standstill

At press time today, we received word that a settlement had been reached in the strike of the underground construction workers union, but will not be ratified by rank and file members until Monday of next week.

The strike, now in its sixth week, has halted work on the laying of water lines for the seven special assessment districts in Farmington Township and on the laying of the Tarabusi Sewer "Arm to the township's industrial park."

"Supervisor" Curt Hall stated that he has been expecting a report at any moment. He expressed concern with the strike which he felt it necessary to restrict the use of water in several subdivisions in the township.

Grand River Avenue because of its adverse affect on business. He gained the support of the Council on looking into alternative measures.

In answer to the City Manager's report labeling the Grand River stretch "a very critical area" for accidents Peterson suggested the traffic lanes should be painted where it was pointed out, none exist. Other avenues which will be investigated as possible alternatives to the elimination of special assessment districts parking along Grand River include a study into the cost of constructing off-street facilities for parking such as exist in Oak Park on similar traffic arteries. The cost of such parking facilities would be met by establishing a special assessment district with the benefiting property owners sharing the expense. Whether or not sufficient right-of-way exists along the stretch to provide such off-street parking will be looked into by the City Manager.

It is hoped the city can come up with a plan to provide a fifth lane for turning movements without creating a problem for businesses along Grand River.

City to Vacate 90-Foot Alley

The Farmington City Council conducted a public hearing on the proposed vacating of a 90-foot alley between Grand River and Shawwassee avenues, north of Wilmanah, at the regular meeting Monday night, July 20, and approved the request made by the adjacent property owners at the last regular council meeting, July 6.

There were no objections to the proposed vacating of the alley, which separates lots 32 and 33 in Assessor's Plat 4, and the council was given assurance the two abutting property owners would assume all costs for providing necessary street lighting and sodding. Easement rights will be retained by the city for servicing any utilities.

Convictions Close Thefts For Twp. Police

The Farmington Township Police Department closed several cases of breaking and entering and car stripping this week as a total of six persons apprehended earlier this month, appeared before Justice of the Peace Allen C. Ingle and were found guilty.

In the most ironic case, four men were arrested in pairs on the same night trying to strip auto parts from cars parked on the Grand River near the Middlebelt within the space of several hours.

DETECTIVE RUSS Conway of the Farmington Township Police was on stake-out at the lot which has been the scene of numerous thefts in recent months. He captured Kenneth Smith, 19, of 21805 Colgate Street in Farmington and a 14-year-old juvenile companion with him attempting to steal a battery from one of the parked cars. The same night, July 6, Detective Conway and an officer with him arrested John Sloan, 28, of 19999 Denby in Detroit and Charles Stump, 18, of 18882 Dally in Detroit, attempting to steal a spare tire out of one of the cars by popping the trunk lid with a crowbar.

Smith, Sloan and Stump were ordered to pay \$15 each in fines with an additional \$36 over-night, plus make full restitution for all damages. The three were also placed on six months probation. The juvenile arrested with Smith was turned over to juvenile court authorities.

After the break-in and entering case cleared up this week, Detective Conway arrested Larry V. Clinegan, 21, of 33945 Oakview in Farmington and Michael Zurich, 29, of 33945 Oakview in Farmington on charges of breaking into the Northwest Shell services station. Both youths were ordered to pay \$15 fines and \$18 oversight costs and placed on six months probation with the added provision that they be in their homes by 8 p.m. every night.

City Council Is Not Satisfied With Apt. House Development

The Farmington City Council took a dim view of the conditions existing between the parking area of the Mooney Street and Shawwassee Avenue apartment and adjacent property at their regular City Council meeting Monday night, July 19.

Councilman Sandy Brotherton charged the greenbelt plan called for between Lakeway and the apartment house parking area have not been fulfilled. The developers, Brotherton added, "haven't done anything to improve the appearance of the whole area."

It was the general feeling of the council that apartments were in need of considerable improvements, some of which it the city's building code. The council agreed to pursue what ever steps might be necessary to get satisfactory greenbelt areas established by the apartment house developers and correct other problems existing.

City Manager John Dinan reported that the developers have hired a landscape architect and planned on erecting a greenbelt and making other plantings. Dinan said, due to the fact this is not the best planting season, the landscaping was being held off until the fall.
