### Embezzlement Warrant Issued for Constable In City of Farmington

A Constable serving the City of Farmington has been charged with the embezzlement of over \$700 and is now sought out of state to answer the charges.

City Police Chief Maurice Foltz reported the warrant for the arrest of Arthur L. Forgette, 53, of Walled Lake, was issued by Senior Assistant Oakland County Prosecutor William E. Lang, after he learned July 17 that accounts handled by the Constable, who has worked for the City since December/ of 1957, were short \$755.
