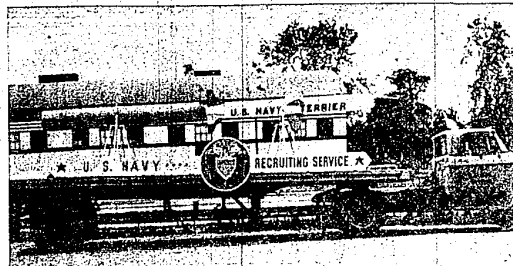

## Navy Guided Missile To Go on Display Here

The Navy TERRIER missile is directed to its target along a radar beam which has been established by the sweep radar finder. The information is relayed electronically to the missile and a collision course is set up. This needle-nosed missile is one of the most accurate guided missiles in operation and has been expected to be a major weapon in the Navy for several years to come.

TERRIER is an all-weather guided missile, designed to intercept enemy aircraft at longer range and higher altitudes than conventional Anti-Aircraft guns. This 13-foot missile, along with its 14-foot booster, weighs about 1.5 tons and has a range of about 20 miles. Its speed is about 2.5 miles per second, or about 1,500 miles per hour. It is eleven inches in diameter and has a span of forty-two inches.

DESIGNED for shipboard use, where it is fired remotely from twin launchers, the TERRIER is installed on the USS BOSTON and the USS CARBONARA, as well as many new navy ships still under construction. It is also adaptable for ground installation and is used by the Maritime Corps on a mobile launcher.

Nearly eight years of development went into the TERRIER. Research was carried out by the Applied Physics Laboratory of Johns Hopkins University and Convair produces the missile in its Naval Industrial Reserve Ordnance Plant, in Pomona, California. ## Single Owner Business Places Still Not Dead

In the income year 1961-62, 21 million of the 7.3 million profitable single-owner businesses had a ratio of net profit to receipts of 50 per cent or more, according to information just released by the Internal Revenue Service and announced last night by L. J. Nixon, Detroit District Director.

Profits for this group amounted to \$9.4 billion, which represents 37 per cent of the total receipts to all profitable sole proprietors.

Mr. Nixon stated that the information was derived by Internal Revenue from returns of 11,371,007 businesses with accounting periods ending during the last half of 1961 or the first half of 1962. It is included in "Statistics of Income—1961-62," U.S. Business Tax Returns.

Other financial ratios, available in the report for the first time for unincorporated businesses, are the ratio of cost of goods sold to business receipts, and the ratio of inventory to purchases.

Included also are detailed income statement statistics by industry group for the three legal forms of business: sole proprietorships, partnerships, and corporations. Historical data are shown for all three forms of business. Balance sheet statistics are available for partnerships and corporations; additional partnership data are available for each of the 50 states.

Mr. Nixon further stated that the entire publication from which the following data pertaining to Sole Proprietorships was taken may be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402, at \$1.50 per copy.
