

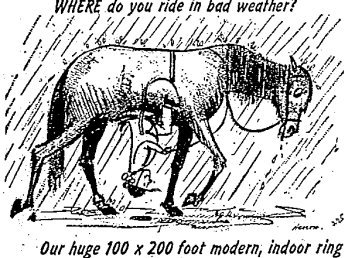
Grand Ole Opry Stars at State Fair
