dents present at the meeting, that allowing half of the Kimberly residents to water lawns at one time lowered the water pressure to the point that no one is able to do a satisfactory job of sprinkling. He also stated the domestic use of water during such watering periods is seriously restricted because of the extensive outdoor use.

Aldo Vagnosi, Democratic candidate for Township Supervisor, and Marty Gluckstein, Democratic candidate for Board Trustee, argued that the township had not taken the necessary precautions to ward off the current water shortage.

TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR Curtis H. Hall challenged the Democrats. He pointed out the strike just ended last week by underground construction workers had held up the completion of the township's water project, originally scheduled to be in service by April 1 of this year. Less than 30 days work remains to be done on the installation of transmission lines to bring Detroit water into the area. Hall pointed out, and getting past the critical period without depleting the water supply to the point where it endangers the carrying on of domestic uses, is the prime consideration being given by township and county officials.

Firecrackers Thrown at Boys

Two Farmington youths were injured, one seriously, July 24, by exploding firecrackers thrown from a car onto the corner where they were standing. The group of about eight other boys was also injured.

The group of young boys was standing on the corner of Prospect Avenue and Loomis Street in the Blue Subdivision in the City of Farmington at about 9:30 p.m. when a car containing two young men drove by and threw the firecrackers onto the pavement in front of them. ONE OF THE firecrackers exploded in front of 10-year-old Bernice Charbonneau, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Barney Charbonneau of 3372 Loomis Street. The youth received burns on the face and neck and a cut on the left shoulder.

The other injured youth, Dennis Hagen, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Hagen of 2363 Hickling Street, received a cut on the leg when one of the firecrackers landed in front of him. Both boys were given first aid by Farmington City Police officers who were called to the scene by Mr. Hagen.

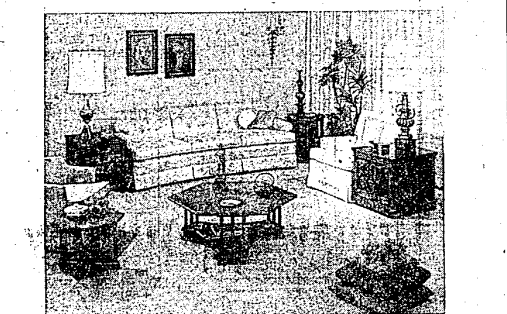
