hearing to allow him to familiarize himself with the plans surrounding the apartment development.

Percy Garhouse, chairman, said they would consider his request and then invited comments from the public who had been heard. Percy By 29333 Millbrook, asked questions regarding water supply. She was also concerned about additional traffic at Mile and Middlebelt roads and asked about other apartment developments proposed for the Township.

Martin Gluckstein, 32107 Chesterbrook, asked some questions which were ruled irrelevant to the hearing and Lee suggested that an entire re-study of planning and zoning be undertaken and stated that "spot re-zoning is unacceptable."

Other questions asked by the audience concerned zoning laws, what classifications there are in the township and what are the classification means.

Wendell Brown renewed his request for a continuation of public hearing. The board granted the request and the matter will be placed on the agenda for the next regular meeting, August 27.

A request to re-zone Jols 259 and 280 of Kimberley subdivision at the southeast corner of Middlebelt and Elvira Mile roads, from R-4 to O (Office classification) was made by applicant Robert Carey. Re-zoning would allow the building of a branch office of the National Bank of Detroit. The Board decided to set up a public hearing for the next regular meeting, August 27.

The next matter to be considered was a continuation of public hearing on the re-zoning of 18.5 acres in the northeast quarter of Section 2, by the Rouge Building Co. This matter, which had been up for discussion several times previously, is scheduled for a hearing at a special meeting on Friday, July 31; but no action could be taken at that time because there were not enough zoning board members present to constitute a quorum.

The request of the Rouge Building Co. is to re-zone 18.5 acres at the southwest corner of Middlebelt and Elvira Mile roads from R-4 to RC to permit the construction of approximately 200 apartment units. The proponents have a

total of approximately 25.1 acres and plan a "buffer" tier of single-family residences on the lots surrounding the apartment development.

Edwin Oglesby, attorney for the proponents, presented the plans of the proposed development and said that he emphasized the desirability of such a development as opposed to a possible future commercial development along the road from Eagle Elementary School.

James Ginn, attorney for Franklin Knolls subdivision which is south and west of the property, brought out points of contention and said that the surrounding property values, storm water runoff problems, and traffic problems. He questioned the need for apartments in that area and suggested that the property could be developed into a single family residential subdivision.

The Board members indicated that they might consider recommending re-zoning of the 18.5 acres if the proponents would include a buffer of two tiers of single family residences instead of the one tier planned. The proponent replied that this would be impossible because it would not leave enough land for the proper development of the apartment area.

The Board voted to deny the re-zoning request on the ground that it "has no merit."

A request to re-zone 33.2 acres in the southwest quarter of Section 1, a triangular area bounded by Middlebelt and Northwestern Highway, and Thirteenth Mile Road, from R-4 to RC to permit the construction of 100 apartment units was also presented by the owners, Robert M. Rosin and Robert Netherlander.

The Board decided to withdraw discussion on the preliminary plans until they have time to look at the site and study the proposal.

Final action of the Board for the evening was approval of the Thompson-Brown Company's plan for two planned-unit subdivision developments. Canterbury Commons number one and two were planned to be built in the south half of Section 3, north of Thirteenth Mile Road and west of Orchard Lake Road. The Thompson-Brown Company has retained Robert Dills, park planning consultant, to handle plans for some open space in this planned unit development.

Dills, who was with the Huron-Clinton Authority for 14 years, presented plans which call for preservation and beautification of land along both sides of a stream which runs the full length of both subdivisions. Included in the plans, he explained, are tricycle tracks, sand boxes, swings and slides, and wood-chip paths for "quiet" walkways. He stated that the stream area would be kept in its natural state and that additional plantings would be of the kind native to the area.

The project, planned to be carried out along the same lines as the nature trails at Kensington Park, will cost approximately \$25,000 according to Dills.

Middlebelt School Addition Approved

At a regular meeting Monday night, the Farmington School Board approved preliminary plans for an addition to Middlebelt School just north of Ten Mile Road.

In discussion, a heating problem in the present school was brought out. Jacob was instructed by the Board to investigate the possibility of putting a slightly larger boiler than the one planned in the addition to take over some of the heating load of the old building.
