Timely Tips on GARDENING By Betty Frankel

"Cuttings" are parts of a plant from which a new plant can be grown. There can be stem cuttings, tuber cuttings, root cuttings and leaf cuttings, depending on the part of the plant from which it is taken. Root cuttings are used only to a limited extent. They are useful for propagating blackberry, currants, raspberries, and other shrubs. These include anemone, japonica, and phlox. Roots the size of a pencil are used. They are cut in late summer or early fall and stored in the same way as stem cuttings until spring. They are then planted in a horizontal position in moist sand or vermiculite.

STEM CUTTINGS are useful in increasing the number of trees and shrubs. Dormant wood cuttings are made from hard wood cut in the winter. They are used to propagate grapes, currants, raspberries, and other shrubs and trees with soft wood.

Soft-wood cuttings or green-wood cuttings are made from wood that is mature enough to break when the twig is bent sharply. When the wood is so soft that it does not break it is not mature enough to make good cuttings. At this time of year, this season's growth has hardened to the extent that it is sharp enough for soft-wood cuttings. At this stage it is called "half ripeness." Soft-wood cuttings are useful for propagating many shrubs, evergreen perennials, and house plants. Plums and apples do not root easily and members of the rose family are difficult to propagate by grafting or budding.

Stem cuttings may consist of the terminal shoot with the bud left intact or they may consist of a section of stem. In either case, make the lower cut just below a node or bud. Use a razor or sharp knife to cut the stem. A clean she cut will offer less chance for infection. The length varies with the plant. One or two sections may be used.

IF TREE CUTTING is of two joints, the lower leaves should be cut off and half of each upper leaf should be removed so as to reduce the leaf surface. It is most important to cut down the rate of moisture loss from the cutting until roots have formed. It is beneficial to dip the ends of the cuttings into a special hormone powder or solution that is specially prepared to induce the rapid formation of roots. Then the ends of the cuttings are inserted in the sharp sand, fine gravel or vermiculite up to the level of the leaves. Keep this medium thoroughly moist at all times.

Ideally, the cuttings should be rooted in a cold frame or in a moist greenhouse but the home gardener can provide a substitute for these. If the cuttings are being rooted in the garden, a large jar or a plastic tent can be put over the cuttings. In the house, a double pot can be used. Set a four-inch diameter pot inside a six-inch diameter pot. Plug the hole in the small pot. Put gravel in the bottom between the pots for drainage and fill the space between the pots with earth. Insert the cuttings in this and fill the inner pot with water. It is helpful to provide some shade for the tops for a short time until the roots begin to form and the cuttings again become independent plants.

MOST EVERGREENS can be rooted from cuttings. Boxwood, yews and azaleas root readily.

stance that holds moisture well is packed around the notch and plastic is wrapped around it. When roots have formed the branch is severed from the parent plant and planted. This system can be used on woody trees and shrubs and is especially useful for rooting tall houseplants such as dieffenbachia.

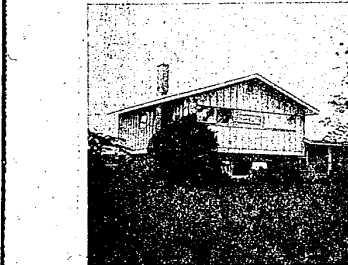
