

Plan Local Art Exhibit

The Farmington Annual Art Exhibit will be held this year from Aug. 23 to Aug. 30 at the University of Farmington, Farmington.

Returning to the local scene after an absence of a year, the popular exhibit will, as in the past, feature all types of art work — painting, drawing, sculpture, collage, sculpture, ceramics and jewelry.

Exhibitors will be from Farmington and many neighboring communities including Southfield, Northville, Plymouth, Redford, Dearborn, Lincoln Park and Garden City.

The exhibit will be open to the public from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday, August 23, and from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday, August 24-30.

All artists interested in participating in the show are invited to call Stanley Hench, 425-1130, or Mrs. Wanda Pusey, GR. 4-5099. There is a 50 cent fee for each entry, and all artists are invited to bring entries suitably framed and mounted for display.

Hench said prize money would be dependent on the number of entries in the show.

Water, Water, Costs at Gill

With so many people in Farmington waiting for water to be brought in from Detroit and the fact that the Gill School addition is located in the "dry" area of Farmington, it is ironic that the striking of water on the site may add to the cost of the addition.

A report by a sub-contractor to the Farmington School Board at their regular meeting Monday night revealed that while digging in preparation for installation of the underground water line, the contractor struck at seven feet. This necessitated extra expenditures for the rental of a pump and pumping for seven days, plus the labor involved.

The sub-contractor reported that in February, the water table was determined to be at nine feet, two inches. He also stated that in the pre-construction bulletins of April 6, he had not said that if water were encountered, there would be an added cost.

He was instructed by the Board to prepare a detailed account of the extra costs and to present them for consideration at a later meeting.

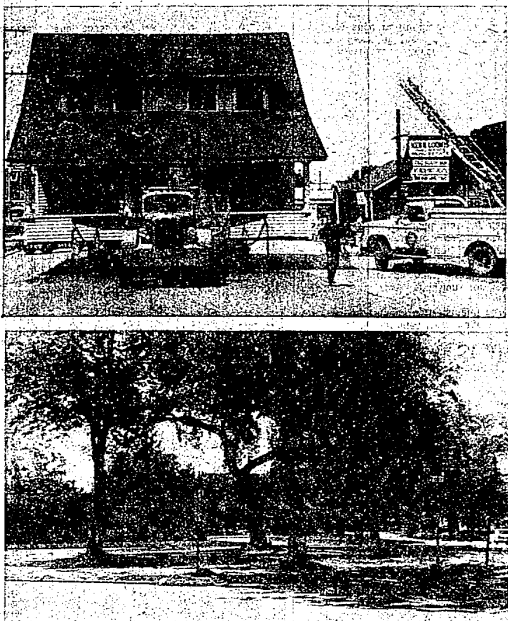

Servise Bldg. To Be Re-Bid

Another revised estimate for the proposed Farmington School District service and maintenance building to be built on the district site with Middlebell was presented by architect J. MacDonald Jacob to a regular meeting Monday night, August 10, and approved by them.

Bids were taken on the original plans and specifications on July 13, but they ran almost \$23,000 higher than the budget of \$33,000 which had been established for the project.

At their July 27 meeting, the Board acted to raise the budget to \$60,000, and instructed the architect to work with the Maintenance Supervisor and personnel to incorporate as many necessary and desirable features as possible to keep within the budget.

The revised estimate being satisfactory, the Board took official action rejecting the bids which were taken July 13, and instructing the architect to re-permit for all students in the district will be on record at both stores.

September 12, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Saturday, September 19, 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

Students living north of 11 Mile Road are requested to use the book store at Bond School, and those south of 11 Mile Road, the book store at Farmington Junior High School.

It was reported that both new and used books will be on sale in both book stores. Also, credit slips for used books turned in by all students in the district will be on record at both stores.

There is no contest for nomination of Sheriff; one contest between Democrats, Lucille D. Marshall and George F. Reuter, for Treasurer; one contest between Democrats, Stanley F. Dunn and Howard A. Siles, for Drain Commissioner; and no contest on the Non-Partisan Probate Judge ballot.

The newly created post, Judge of the Court of Appeals, has drawn a field of 14 candidates seeking to be among the six to be placed on the November ballot. Voters in Farmington City and Township, a portion of the 2nd District, will vote for three candidates; and the six candidates with the highest number of votes will be on the ballot.

Candidates are: Farrell E. Roberts, Howard R. Carroll, Louis D. McGregor, Donald R. Freeman, Francis J. O'Brien, William L. Tait, Fredrick J. Plotts, Earl E. McDonald, Jack Hanna, Timothy Quinn, Thomas Giles Kavanaugh, Charles N. Murphy, William Ross, and Donald W. Jargant.

Contests in the Township, as previously announced, are for Township Supervisor and Constable on the Republican ticket, and for Justice of the Peace on the Democratic ticket.

William Christmas failed to have enough qualified signatures on his nominating petition and will not be listed on the ballot, but he has announced his intention to run as "write-in" or "sticker" candidate on the Republican ticket.

The six Republican candidates, of which four are to be selected for Constables, are Ralph Evert, Hugh Owen, Billy Miller, Morris Harcourt, Clarence J. McManus, and Thomas Williams.

The only other Township contest is for Justice of the Peace, with Gerald A. Freedman opposed to James F. Lawrence.

Biographical data on all of the candidates will be published before the September 1 Primary.
