Sgt. Garden To Head City's Detective Div.

Farmington Public Safety School, MSU-O Command Officers Course, Homicide Investigation Course and the F-B-I training course. Boy Breaks His Leg

Dennis Pooley, 16, of Grand River Avenue in Farmington was injured Friday afternoon August 14, behind the Farmington Junior High School when he fell off the steps leading down to the City Park.

The youth was taken to Redford Medical Center, Seven Mile and Grand River Avenue, by Brooks Ambulance for treatment of a broken leg. Farmington City Police officers applied a splint to the boy's leg at the scene of the accident.

Woman, 75, Killed By Car Crossing Grand River

A pedestrian was struck and was at the scene to lead in the investigation.

ACCORDING TO accounts from two men near the scene shortly before the accident, Mrs. Wallbank was on the south side of Grand River Avenue, apparently preparing to cross to the north side of Grand River Avenue where her home is located. They did not see her cross the street or witness the accident.

City police theorize Mrs. Wallbank may have reached the north side of Grand River and then stumbled back onto the highway, since Link's car was traveling in the curb lane of Grand River and it was his right front fender which struck the woman. She had been carrying a heavy load of groceries.

Link told police he was driving between 25 and 30 miles per hour at the time of the accident. The speed limit at that point on Grand River Avenue is posted at 35 miles per hour. Link was released Friday night after making a statement to Farmington City Police. He was scheduled to make a statement Monday, August 17, at the Oakland County Prosecutor's office. 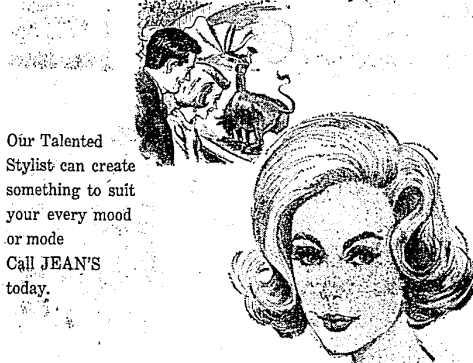
