

# ONLY TWO TWP. PRIMARY RACES; MORE AT OAKLAND COUNTY LEVEL


The September 1 Primary will present a host of candidates to the voters from both the major political parties for nomination in the November 3 General Election. The Farmington Enterprise this week is carrying biographical information on candidates for state, county and local offices where there are more than one running for the party nomination.

Information on all candidates running for the State Senate, State House of Representatives and U.S. Congress was carried in last week's (August 20) Enterprise. Copies of the August 20 issue of the Enterprise are still available for those who missed the material on these important races.

SINCE THERE IS "no contest" in the Primary in several of the races, the Enterprise is concentrating on those candidates who have opposition in the September 1 Primary. Full biographical information on all of the candidates who are "unopposed" in the September 1 Primary will be published in the Enterprise prior to the November 3 General Election.

There are only two offices at the township level where there is a contest. Two Democrats are running for their party's nomination in the race for Township Justice of the Peace. Gerald Freedman and James P. Lawson are the Democrats seeking nomination. Byron Walter is unopposed for the Republican nomination.

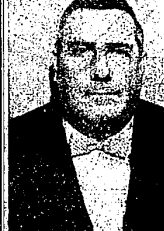
Evert is a graduate of Cass Technical High School in Detroit and attended Wayne State University and the Detroit Institute of Technology.

## Senator Hart To Run Again



Philip A. Hart, Democrat, running for a second term in the U.S. Senate, started his political career by accident.

In 1948, no one could be found to run for Democratic precinct chairman in the heavily-Republican suburb of Bloomfield Hills, so Hart wrote in his own name, called his wife to round up a few more votes and won the election.

The next year Hart was appointed Michigan Corporation and Securities Commissioner by a newly-elected governor. He had first met in law school — G. Mennen Williams.

He was elected to the Senate in 1958 after serving four years as lieutenant governor.

He was chosen to succeed Estes Kefauver as chairman of the Senate Antitrust and Monopoly Subcommittee. He was picked as a floor manager of the Civil Rights bill.

Hart authored the "Truth in Packaging" bill. He co-sponsored the "Truth in Lending" bill. He and Senator Kefauver got principal credit for passage of the Drug Act of 1956, designed to lower drug prices and tighten safety regulations.

Hart introduced legislation to create national park developments at Sleeping Bear Dunes and Pictured Rocks.

He brought a \$2.5 million federal pollution research laboratory to Ann Arbor and co-sponsored a pollution research bill that passed Congress 115 yeas. He also worked on plans to stabilize the levels of the Great Lakes.

HART HAS BEEN a strong backer of the Kennedy-Johnson program, including the tax cut, aid to education, Medicare and improved Social Security, and the War on Poverty.

And Congress this year passed his bill to create a National Commission on Automation and Technology — a commission to channel more research effort into community needs and to find new ways to ease the impact of automation.

Hart's Michigan home is on Mackinac Island. He is married to the late four-year Jane Briggs of Detroit. They have eight children — four boys and four girls.

## James F. O'Neil In Senate Race

James F. O'Neil, Republican, is a Member of State Board of Education of Michigan. He was a recent Candidate for the U.S. Congress and he is a former Community College Trustee.

Mr. O'Neil holds degrees from Indiana University (B.S.) and the University of Detroit (M.B.A.) and has taken additional studies at University of Michigan, Wayne State University and Albion College.

Mr. O'Neil has long been active in civic and educational affairs, serving as President of his college alumni group in Detroit and as President and director of the Rosedale Garden Civic Association. He was instrumental in organizing the Northwest Wayne County Community College District and establishing Schoolcraft College. He also served on the College's first Board of Trustees. He is a member of the P.T.A., has actively worked on United Foundation/Campaigns and has been a Junior Achievement Advisor.

MR. O'NEIL HAS been recipient of awards the past two years from his fellow employees and company for his outstanding community service. In 1963 he also received their Citizen of the Year Award.

Mr. O'Neil is a combat veteran of World War II. He served as a Bomber Navigator in the 5th Air Force in the South Pacific, earning seven battle stars and the air medal with two clusters.

Mr. O'Neil lives in Livonia with his wife, Elaine, and two sons, Mark, 11, and David, 4. He is employed as Planning and Programming Manager in the Ford Motor Company's Styling Office.

# Oakland County Circuit Court Race Pits Seven Candidates

In the September 1 Primary election, there are seven men seeking election to the new, reorganized Oakland County Circuit Court with three men to be elected. Running in the race for circuit court judges are the three appointed judges, Arthur E. Moore, James Thornburn and Phillip E. Pratt, and four challengers, James Clarkson, Allen C. Ingle, John E. McGrath and Gordon S. Smith.


Biographical information on the candidates who submitted material to the Enterprise follows:

Circuit Judge Arthur E. Moore announced his candidacy for election to the office of Circuit Judge of Oakland County. He was appointed to this office by Governor Romney in February of 1963. Prior to that date, he served continuously as Probate Judge from 1958 to 1959. JUDGE MOORE is a graduate of the University of Michigan Law School and Literature School. He was one of the founders and is now presently Chairman of the Board of Directors of Camp Oakland, Inc. He was the first president of the Joseph Oak Kiwanis Club and was likewise the first president of the Pontiac Boy's Club. He has served as director of the Michigan Children's Aid Society and Oakland County Child Guidance Clinic and was formerly a presiding judge of the probate courts and president of the State Court Judges' Association. He is a trustee of the Royal Oak Methodist Church.

In the Spring of 1964, he was appointed Executive Judge of the seven Oakland County circuit courts. In this capacity he is responsible for the administrative affairs of the courts. Having to do with budget, probation work and marriage conciliation services of the court.

JUDGE MOORE stated that he had desired to contribute towards the excellency of the Oakland County Circuit Courts, which he asserts are being conducted in a most exemplary fashion. He looks forward to even greater progress, namely an enlarged and embracing probation service for the circuit court and municipal courts of the State; also, for the interrelation of a court marriage conciliation service with the newly organized Religious Assistance Counseling Services now being undertaken by 500 churches of the County.

Judge Moore sponsored the recent program of the Probate Court for a children's diagnostic village, which is now being constructed and was instructed by the Probate Court.
