

14 Candidates Seeking Election To Court Of Appeals

The Michigan Constitution of 1963 creates a new Court of Appeals, whose judges will review the decision of Michigan's trial courts.

The Court of Appeals was provided for by the new State Constitution to allow easier appeals for litigants and to relieve the backlog of cases appealed to the State Supreme Court.

Farmington City and Township voters will vote for three

of the total number of 14 candidates seeking nomination September 1 for the November 3 General Election. The six top vote-getters in the Primary will appear on the November ballot and three will be elected to serve in the Second Judicial District which includes all of southeastern Michigan (except the First District) from the Ohio border to the end of the thumb area; the balance of out-

state Michigan comprises the Third Judicial District.

As enacted, the bill follows the constitutional provision for nine judges. Three judges will be elected from each of three election districts at the general election Nov. 3.

Candidates seeking election in the Second Judicial District are: Farrell E. Roberts, Howard R. Carroll, Louis D. McGreggor, Donald E. Freeman, Francis L. O'Brien, William L. Taft, Frederick J. Plotts, Earl E. McDonald, Jack Hansen, Timothy C. Quinn, Thana Giles Karanough, Charles N. Murphy, William Ross and Donald William Sargent. Three will be elected with the six top Primary vote-getters to appear on the November ballot.

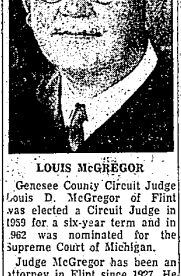


FARRELL E. ROBERTS

Farrell E. Roberts, Oakland County State Senator and Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, is a 42-year-old attorney currently serving his second term in the Senate after two terms as a State Representative. He is a partner in the Pontiac law firm of Dietrich and Roberts, 2057 Orchard Lake Road, Pontiac.

Roberts, and his wife, the former Phyllis E. Miller of Benton Harbor, have two sons, Mark and Bruce. Their home is at 2486 Lafayette, West Bloomfield Township. He and his family are members of the Pine Hill Congregational Church in West Bloomfield Township.

LOUIS MCGREGGOR

Genesee County Circuit Judge Louis D. McGreggor of Flint was elected a Circuit Judge in 1959 for a six-year term and in 1962 was nominated for the Supreme Court of Michigan.

Judge McGreggor has been an attorney in Flint since 1927. He is an alumnus of the Detroit College of Law, Detroit Teachers College (now Wayne State University) and Eastern Michigan University.

Judge McGreggor has been active in conservation work for many years. He is president of the National Wildlife Federation, the world's largest conservation organization, and formerly was president of Michigan United Conservation Clubs. In 1963, the Judge was a member of the Governor's Special Conservation Study Committee.

Judge McGreggor is active in civic affairs. He was the president of the Flint Optimist Club and was governor of the Michigan District of Optimist International (1958-60). He is a member of the Flint Chamber of Commerce, Genesee Lodge 174 F&AM, Saginaw Shrine, Elks, Oddfellows, the American Contract Bridge League, and for three years served as chairman of the Salvation Army Advisory Board of Flint.

Tax Fighter Goes After Court Post

FLINT — A judge who has been called a "one-man army" against city income taxes is seeking election to the new Michigan Court of Appeals.



Judge Donald R. Freeman, a member of Flint's Municipal Court, successfully fought against an income tax that would have put an additional burden on the backs of city residents and those who live in the suburbs.

It was Judge Freeman's contention that such a tax was illegal, and his group not only defeated it in an election, but also carried a fight to the Michigan Supreme Court after years. For eight years he was chairman of the Judiciary Committee of the Michigan House of Representatives.

Judge Carroll graduated from Michigan State University and Detroit College of Law with highest honors. He has been an attorney for twenty years. He is fifty-six years of age. Judge and Mrs. Carroll have five children.

Circuit Judge Howard R. Carroll of Macomb County has announced his intention to become a candidate for the Second District Court of Appeals.

Judge Carroll has served eight years on the Circuit Court Bench. He was a member of the Michigan Legislature for ten years. For eight years he was chairman of the Judiciary Committee of the Michigan House of Representatives.

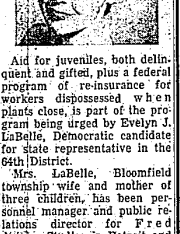

He served in the United States Army from 1942 to 1945 in the Criminal Investigation Division of the Provost Marshall General of the United States and worked actively with Scotland Yard, the English police, and the French police. Upon discharge from the service, he again engaged in the private practice of law in the City of Ann Arbor. In 1946 he served as Chief Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Washtenaw County.

William Ross, 41, of 21500 Mason Blvd., Ann Arbor, has been a practicing attorney for 13 years. He has held a number of city-government legal posts in Macomb County. He is a member of the Oakland County, Michigan, and American Bar Associations. He is also a member of the American Judicature Society and Delta Theta Phi Law Fraternity.

A strong believer in the necessity for such a Court, Roberts was sponsor of the bill setting up the Court. He successfully fought for its passage after a similar bill failed to pass the 1963 Second Extra Session.

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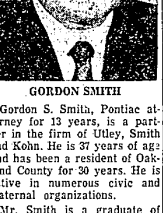
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GORDON SMITH

Mr. Smith is a graduate of the Detroit College of Law and a member of the Oakland County Bar Association and the Michigan State Bar. He served for several years on the Budget

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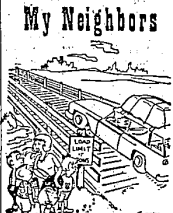
