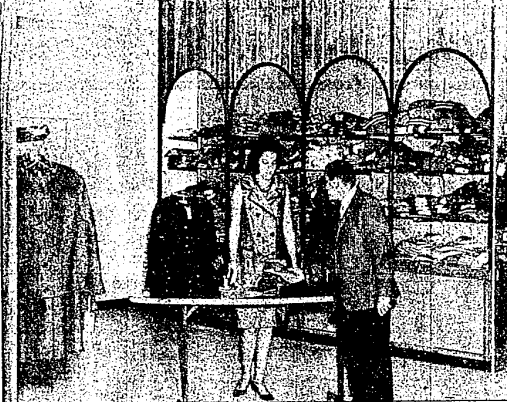
Miss Janice Skow of Mayfield Ave. is again reported on the sick list.

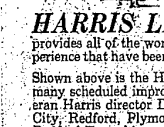

Jim Dickerson Comments on G-O-P Meeting

Responding to questions on the Republican unity conference called by the party's presidential nominee recently in Hershey, Pennsylvania, 19th District congressional candidate Jim Dickerson stated that he was "pleased" with the results.

"The statement by Senator Goldwater in which he welcomed diversity of Republican viewpoint indicates his strong desire to work with all Republicans during the coming election. I believe that one of the great strengths of the Republican Party has been its tradition of encouraging diversity of viewpoint that results in a creative contribution from many individuals."

"I'M SURE THE Senator acted very wisely in again indicating that he will not accept support from racist or extremist groups. He has stated that he will campaign on the platform adopted at the 1964 convention and not on personalities. I agree in this wholeheartedly. I believe the 1964 platform has many positive programs that I would support as a congressman."

"The platform," said Dickerson, "who has made emphatic endorsements of several sections of the document, particularly those dealing with education and taxation, indicates the need to return more responsibilities to state and local governments in the area of domestic affairs."

"It also stressed the need for tax and regulatory agency reforms that will encourage private businesses rather than rely on a continued increase in federal spending. It puts emphasis on the individual and his responsibilities in the community."

"IT INDICATES the need for clarity in our foreign policies and a clear indication of our firmness of resolve in dealing with aggression."

Asked for comment about the endorsement of Richard Kuhn by the Conservative Club of Oakland County, Dickerson said, "I think it's very interesting that this group endorsed Richard Kuhn without even a courtesy interview with the other candidates. I personally have never been contacted by them and hence wonder on what basis they made their comparison of the candidates. This certainly doesn't sound as though they believe in Senator Goldwater's philosophy of diversity of opinion within the Republican Party."

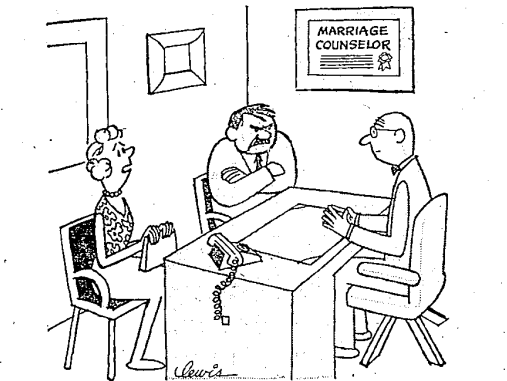
