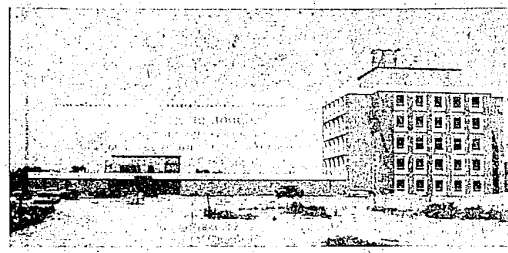


New Building Going On Everywhere in City, Township



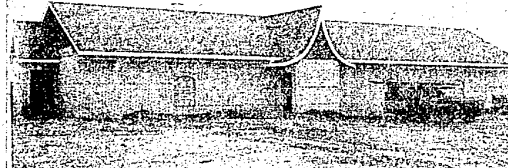
BOTSFORD GENERAL HOSPITAL will open early in 1965 to serve the Farmington area. The new hospital, pictured above, is being constructed on a site north

Road. Located on the northeast corner of the busy intersection, the new restaurant is expected to open next month.



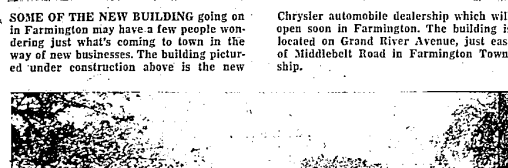

Urging Extra Hours in Twp. For Registering

The Farmington Democratic Club has called on the Farmington Township Clerk to make enough voter registration facilities available so that a maximum number of citizens are able to participate in this fall's elections.

Farmington Democratic Club Chairman Aldo Vagnozzi has suggested that a minimum voter registration program would be to keep Township Hall facilities open on Saturdays during the month of September and on Oct. 2 and to take registrations at least one evening in each of the polling places.

"This would provide an opportunity for persons to register who are unable to do so during the present week-day hours of township offices," Vagnozzi said.

"An extra effort is needed this year because of the switch from four-year to two-year registration periods," Vagnozzi said. "Many people who would have been registered under the four-year rule have lost their registration under the two-year limit and must re-register if they are to vote this year."

VFW Aux. Pres. At Convention
