### What's In A Name?

### Name Ball Field After Jaycees

At least a portion of the Farmington City Park on Shawassee Road will carry the name of the Farmington Jaycees as the result of action taken by the city council at its regular meeting Monday night.

The main ball field, now known as "Jaycee's Ball Field," The original proposal was that the whole city park be named Jaycee's Park but it resulted in such heated controversy and discussion that JC officials asked that the matter be dropped.

Even naming of one of the baseball diamonds after the Jaycee organization resulted in some discussion Monday night. The councilmen objected to naming a ball field for the Jaycees but how it should be worded resulted in a difference of opinion.

One councilman felt it should be Jaycee Field while another thought it should be Jaycee Diamond and still another Jaycee Ball Diamond. City Manager John Dinan's original suggestion of "Jaycee's Ball Field" finally won out.

When the city can make improvements without having a formal easement or whether it will be necessary to purchase a six-foot-wide easement or condemn the property for an easement in order to make this needed improvement. He estimated that the appraised market value for such an easement on the lowland property in the valley should be no more than \$200 or \$300.

THE CONNECTION with discussion on this sanitary sewer problem, Councilman Howard Thayer also raised a question regarding sewer backup problems being experienced by at least one or two homeowners on Oakland Avenue near Wilmarth. What changes may be necessary to correct this situation were not outlined. Thayer indicated, however, that homeowners were getting quite upset with sewer-water backups in their basements occurring during heavy storm periods and might start legal action against the city unless corrective measures are taken.

City Manager Dinan and the city engineer were instructed to investigate this matter as soon as possible.

It was expected that a complete report on these sewer line backup problems could be ready by the next regular meeting of the council on Monday, Sept. 14.

### Set Special Voter Signup Day in City

City Clerk Treva Quinn reported this week that she is planning to sign up voters on registration date prior to the deadline for new residents to be registered as voters to qualify as electors in the November General Election.

On Saturday, Oct. 3, she will be at her office in the city hall from 8 a.m. until 12 noon specifically to sign up voters who find it impossible to get in to register during regular city office hours Monday through Friday during the week.

On Monday, Oct. 5, final registration day, her office will be open from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. for last minute registrants.

### Village Green Economic Study

\$24,500,000 from the project, which in addition to the apartment, includes plans for a golf course clubhouse (\$2,500,000). This revenue would be equivalent to 16.27 per cent of the total cost of the Farmington Interceptor Sewer and would amount to an estimated \$9,040,000 per year, derived from local spending for services and other living expenses from the occupants. An estimated \$720,000 a year would be realized by local employees at the Village Green.

The economic effect of local spending by the occupants of the proposed development is based on the tables published by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, Survey of Consumer Expenditures (1959-61).

THE AMOUNT OF revenue which would be applied to wards the township's debt service on the interceptor sewer is estimated at \$728,000. This revenue would be provided by the sewer-tap-in fees paid by the apartments (\$700,000), the inn with 200-guest rooms (\$18,000), the 16 stores (\$5,000) and the golf course clubhouse (\$2,500,000). This revenue would be equivalent to 16.27 per cent of the total cost of the Farmington Interceptor Sewer and would amount to an estimated \$9,040,000 per year, derived from local spending for services and other living expenses from the occupants. An estimated \$720,000 a year would be realized by local employees at the Village Green.

The Farmington Township Zoning Board has the complete economic survey report on the Village Green development and will be considering it at their meeting tonight whether to approve the necessary re-zoning sought by the builders. The project, announced several months ago by Duke brothers, has been under extensive study by members of the Zoning Board.



### Class Opens in Med. Training

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Isolation Techniques; Emergency Sanitation; Medical Aspects of the Shelter Program; and disaster relief in any home or community emergency or need as well as offering her (or him) an understanding of emergency hospital procedures.

Installation of walk along Farmington Road from Shawassee to Ten Mile, on Project Street north of Shawassee and on two lots on Picket Avenue is called for. DeMaestri & Sons bid of \$2,500 was the low bid of four bids received for this work.

During discussion on this matter, one or two councilmen brought out the fact that walks in two or three streets elsewhere in the city were in bad condition and suggested that the owners of this property be asked to have the walks replaced or repaired yet this summer by the same contractor. City Manager John Dinan agreed to check into this matter and see if the additional work could also be done at this time.

area immediately around them which may not. Leaders added, KIMBERLEY and Lincolnshire subdivisions and the area around them have been listed to be served from a transmission line running up Inkster Road and then westward along Eleven Mile Road. Construction of this transmission line, which is under the supervision of the Detroit Water Board and not the Oakland County Dept. of Public Works, is running behind schedule, Leaders said.

No indication was given on how far work on this transmission line was behind schedule. It was reported, however, that it might be possible to hook both the Kimberley and Lincolnshire subdivisions into the line running up Middlebelt Road from Eight Mile, at least on a temporary basis, if there was to be any substantial delay in getting the Inkster Road transmission line in.

Whether or not this will be possible from an engineering standpoint had not yet been totally checked out as of press time on Wednesday of this week.
