Scott caught a Smallmouth Bass in Long Lake weighing 4 lbs. 2 ozs. and 1 1/4 in. in length on August 18.

Don caught a 4 lb. 6 oz. Smallmouth Bass on Aug. 19.

"As fitting recognition for expert and successful fishermen, the Grand Traverse Bay Region of Northwestern Michigan, a few years ago formed the Che-Ge-Gon Club. To qualify for membership in the Che-Ge-Gon Club, one must catch a fish large enough to satisfy the specification limits of the Club.

The fish must be weighed and measured by a member of the Chamber's Conservation Committee.

When a verification of the minimum weight or measure-ment is presented to the Chamber of Commerce, Traverse City, Michigan, bearing the signature of any of the committee, the fisherman is awarded a Che-Ge-Gon plaque with his name and address and a notarized report of the fish which qualified him for membership.
