

## 2 Local Men on Early Canvass UF Drive Team

Selection of certain Detroit area firms for pre-campaign canvass to obtain early pacesetter corporate gifts has been made by the General Manufacturing Unit of the 1964 Torch Drive, which includes Harold S. Bliss and Edward C. Curme, among its team captains.

Bliss, of Farmington Township, is purchasing agent for the Ford Motor Co. Transmission and Chassis Div. Curme, of 2314 Craftsburg, Farmington, is Corporate Staff Analyst for Ex-Cell-O Corp.

Group meetings of captains and co-captains in the unit are being held to determine pre-campaign progress in obtaining participation by corporate leaders.

The unit, headed by Harold G. Warner, general manager of the Cadillac Motor Division of General Motors, is responsible for the canvass of 150 manufacturing and service firms. All major non-automotive industry is assigned to this unit.

A meeting of the unit will be held at the Sheraton-Cadillac Hotel on Oct. 15 to report all company gifts received up to that time.

Last year, the General Manufacturing Unit raised \$1,600,000 against a pre-assigned quota of \$1,538,582. A total of \$71,690,221 was realized by all units.

The 16th annual Torch Drive will be held Oct. 20 through Nov. 12 to raise money for the 1965 budgets of local, state, and national health, state, and community services.

## New Bowling Program A Farmington Lanes

Farmington Lanes is in the process of getting ready for the new season of special leagues. On the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades of Beechview, Ten Mile, Gill, and Flinders elementary schools. The coaches, including Mrs. Jacquelyn Amperse, Mr. Fred Hamlin, proprietor of the Lanes, and Mr. Danny Campbell, of the Youth Bowling Association met last Friday for a morning of instruction and planning for the new program.

Mrs. Hamlin is initiating this program for beginners with the cooperation of the schools, however, the regular Saturday leagues for more experienced junior bowlers will still continue as it has in the past.

**THE NEW PROGRAM** will begin on September 18, with Beechview Elementary; Ten Mile on Monday, September 22; Gill on Tuesday, September 22; and Flinders on Wednesday, September 23. The schools will meet each week on their

appointed day for two games of bowling and intensive instruction and supervision. The league will run for fourteen weeks from September to December. The total cost is \$130 per week which will include rental shoes, Youth Bowling Association registration and transportation.

A bus, chartered by Farmington Lanes, will pick up the boys and girls after school each week and bring them to the bowling center. After their bowling session they will be returned to within a block of their homes.

This is a brand new program of fun and recreation for boys and girls, and Farmington Lanes is well experienced in helping the children of this area realize the pleasure of good bowling.


## STRIKES and SPARES
