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General Property Tax Costs Second Only to Income Taxes
(Editor's note: This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)
Knowing your rights in regard to your property taxes can save you a great deal of aggravation and at times can save you money. After all, the state general property tax costs the average Michigan resident more than any other revenue measure except the federal income tax.
Except for numerous exempt categories of property, among them household goods and motor vehicles, all tangible property is assessed yearly. Its taxable status, location for tax purposes, and value are determined as of tax day which is the previous December 31. The actual assessment is made in cities and villages by assessors and in townships by the assessor or supervisor.
DURING THE MONTHS of January and February, these officials prepare an assessment roll which lists all the taxable property in their respective districts, the person who is deemed the taxable owner, and their best estimate of its value. This assessment roll is submitted to the local board of review which meets on the Tuesday following the first Monday in March for its first session and a week later for its second session.
