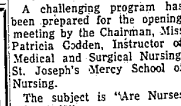
The subject is "Are Nurses Educated?"

Timely Tips on GARDENING

SUMAC

Streamers of flaming red leaflets hang like signal flags from the branches of the staghorn sumac, making them the most brilliant of all the plants at this season. The spreading mounds of crimson now blaring on upland hills and edging woodlands are thickets of sumac.

This small tree, *Rhus typhina*, adds so much beauty to the natural scene but is used all too seldom in landscape plantings around our homes and public buildings. Groups of staghorn sumac could be massed at the edges of a large property, or an individual tree might be the perfect accent plant in a small yard. It grows to 30 feet in height and forms a handsome rounded crown of tree or large shrub.

The staghorn sumac is beautiful at all seasons of the year. In spring the feathery leaves are soft olive green delicately tinged with pink or red. As the new growth appears, the stems are covered with a soft, fuzzy rose pink fuzz. This soft down has given this plant the popular name of velvet sumac.

The leaves, which resemble large, graceful ferns, are borne only on new wood and therefore are only found at the tips of the branches. The leaves grow rapidly and soon are a deep green and are up to 15 to 30 inches in length, producing a rather tropical effect.

IN JUNE THE TREES are covered with panicles of flowers. The loose sprays of greenish white flowers and the staminate flowers which produce the pollen. Other trees that produce pink clusters of pistillate flowers. By summer the crimson cone-shaped fruits, or "bobs," have formed from these. They are composed of tight clusters of fruits. Each fruit has a tiny cherry-like pit enclosed in firm flesh and covered with a fuzzy skin. These fruits are eaten by birds in late winter when other birds are scarce.

When autumn comes the sumac leaves are among the first to change color. Only the Virginia creeper blazes up before the sumac. It turns a bright crimson of an unmatched brilliance. The green that prevails in the growth of the other foliage acts as a foil, making the red sumac seem even more intense.

In winter the dark bark and the picturesque zig-zag branching make a dramatic display. The reason for the name staghorn sumac is that when the antler-like branches are revealed. The branches end in coarse, wide-spreading twigs bearing the winered fruit clusters which contrast beautifully with winter snows.

SUMAC MAY be planted in either Spring or Fall. It transplants easily and is also easy to grow from seeds, from shoot cuttings, or from root cuttings. It needs a sunny location and well-drained soil that is not too rich.

In addition to the staghorn, or velvet sumac there are other note-worthy members of this family group. The smoke tree.

'65 License Plates To Go on Sale Nov. 1

Michigan motorists can now purchase 1964 license plates at half price.

However, the new half-price schedule does not include watercraft plates or half-year commercial and half-year trailer plates.

In making the announcement, the Secretary of State disclosed that 1965 plates — and they'll be the last — will go on sale to the general public November 1. A "rush" is expected at branch offices all over Michigan when the plates go on sale.

Also effective on November 1, the state will discontinue issuing replacement passenger plates for one dollar when the originals are rusted or faded. Instead, if a motorist wishes replacement plates for 1964, he will have to pay a fee of two dollars.
