

Traffic Light Over Labor Day

The Labor Day weekend passed without a single traffic fatality marring the holiday in the City and Township of Farmington.

Farmington Township Police Chief Irving Yakes and Director of the Farmington City Public Safety Department, Maurice Foltz, both reported traffic over the three-day weekend as unusually light and few serious traffic accidents occurred.

CHIEF YAKES had a total of six auxiliary policemen on duty along with a total of 11 regular Township police officers in what he termed a successful campaign to hold down accidents and prevent serious traffic jams. On the regular day shift, six Township police officers and three auxiliary policemen were on duty with just one less regular police officer on duty during the afternoon shift along with three auxiliary policemen.

There were just three injury accidents reported by the township over the Labor Day weekend. There were no serious injury accidents at all in the City over the three-day holiday.


