City Council Tables Request By Elks For Liquor Permit

Action on the permits was tabled at Monday night's City Council meeting.

The examination on first degree murder charges against 45-year-old Wells S. Herrington in the gunshot slaying of his wife's suitor, Dr. John R. Poster, 41, a Birmingham dentist, is scheduled to open at 10 a.m. tomorrow morning in the Farmington Municipal Court of Judge Sylvester J. Pheney. Herrington stood mute at his arraignment on the charge last Thursday following in his Farmington West apartment. He and his wife, Betty, 42, were talking his wife, Betty, 42, were talking

his wife, Betty, 42, were talking over a reconciliation after a separation of several months during which time she had been seeing Foster.

Foster, according to statements obtained by the Parmington City Police, had gone to Mrs. Herrington's home at 33011 Grand River Avenue where he learned she had gone to her husband's apartment. He was shet twice, once in the left leg and once in the chest, when he attempted to gain entry into Herrington's apartment for the Herrington was partment for the Herrington who had driven her mother to the reconciliation.
