

Rocket Varsity Bows To East Detroit, 6-0

The Farmington Little League football varsity bowed Sunday to East Detroit, 6-0, on the winner's gridiron.

The Farmington defense, led by Heuman and supported by a host of others, held a good East Detroit to six points.

On the second week in a row the Farmington Rocket Varsity went against a bigger team and proved their hearts in a losing cause. However, the offense did not keep up with the defense.

The offensive line was unable to contain the onrushing Mid-Jets defense, who continued to rush the passers, making practically everything that was thrown go awry. The runner never were able to get started.

With the Rocket defense fighting on gallantly, the Mid-Jets were held around mid field throughout most of the game. Close to the end of the second period, East Detroit recovered a Farmington fumble on the Rockets' 10-yard line. Three plays later, they bulled over for their lone score. The Rockets held on the extra point try.

One of the few times the large Farmington contingent of rooters had anything to cheer about came in the last period,

as Bobby Dwyer, playing heads-up, was able to snatch the ball out of an E. Detroit man's hands and race 40 yards with it. But here again the attack fizzled and the Rockets were not able to cash in on the break.

Intercepted passes by Craig Gow and Ricky Herpiek also were able to stir the crowd, in a steady diet of pizza and malts.

Next game is Saturday, Sept. 26, at Farmington High School, starting at noon.

Lancer Gridders Win Season Opener 26-7

The Our Lady of Sorrows High School football team opened the season right, but didn't live up to its "prediction" as the Lakers walked over Our Lady of the Lakes, 26 to 7! The Lakers may have some inexperienced players but the team as a whole proved to be a wiser-than-thou bunch.

From the opening kick-off, the Lakers were never behind. O.L.S. kicked off to the Lakers, and on the kickoff a Laker fumbled the ball on his forty yard line.

MIKE BARS was "Johnny on the spot" and picked up the ball and galloped home with a touchdown on the very first play of the game.

On the try for extra point, Miles Kearney crossed the goal line to make the score 7 to 0 in favor of Sorrows.

The Lakers fumbled the ball again and Lancer Jim McGrath recovered for Sorrows. On the very next play Sorrows quarterback, Jim McGrath, handed off to Miles Kearney who slashed 32 yards for the third Lancers' second touchdown. The try for extra point failed.

When the Lakers got their hands on the ball again, Miles Kearney was again the star, scoring a touchdown on a play through the middle, but only to have the play called back because of off-side.

At the seven-minute mark of the second quarter, Lancer Dennis Connelly broke through the line and with sheer power rushed 38 yards for the third Lancer touchdown. The try for extra point failed, but the Lakers led 19 to 9 at the half.

In the third quarter, Lancer Pave Sutton ran off tackle on the weak side and found open field ahead for a 25-yard touchdown run.

MILES KEARNEY ran the extra point to climax the Lancer scoring.

The Lakers showed some signs of having an offense late in the third quarter and finally mustered an offensive attack with ten minutes left in the game.

A punt by Lancer Miles Kearney was a blocked and the ball was recovered by Our Lady of the Lakes on Sorrows' seven yard line.

The Lakers then capitalized on the blocked punt as they scored their only T.D. on a 7 yard touchdown pass. The extra point was good and the final sun sounded to end the game with O.L.S. ahead 26 to 7.

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board of Road, Motion approved unanimously was called to order on September 14, 1964 at 8:00 p.m. by Mr. Curt Hall, Chairman. Members present were: Hall, Cairns, Avery, Duke, Opperhauer, Bassette, and Walter. Mr. Joseph T. Brennan, Township Attorney, also present. (Mr. Walter arrived at 9:05 p.m.)

Minutes will stand approved as published.

MOTION by Duke, supported by Opperhauer, to pay bills No. 14681-14753 and No. 1219 (124 from the appropriate lands. Motion approved unanimously.

MOTION by Duke, supported by Opperhauer, to grant the approval of the Township to serve alcoholic beverages in the concourse area with the stipulations that at no time, under any circumstances, will a minor be allowed inside this establishment after 5:00 p.m. if there is any drinking before 5:00 p.m. It will be in the Bar area only. The Liquor License will be revoked if any minor is found in this establishment under said regulations. Motion approved. Roll Call: 5 yeas, 2 nays.

AMENDMENT TO MOTION by Opperhauer, supported by Duke, that the above motion be given a trial period until April 1, 1965 only. Motion approved.

Roll Call: 5 yeas, 2 nays.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Avery, to raise the starting pay for patrolmen to \$5,200.00 per year and to raise present salaries \$200.00 across the board. Motion approved unanimously.

MOTION by Avery, supported by Bassette, that the delinquent special assessment rolls, No. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 thru 10, 11, 12 thru 20, water districts 1, 3, 4, 6, 7, 9 and 11 also delinquent water bills in Section 36 Water System and Grand River Homes Water System, also unpaid water cutting and Sewer Connection charges, payments as reported by the Treasurer; be reassessed and placed on the tax roll by the Supervisor. Roll Call: 7 yeas, 0 nays.

MOTION by Duke, supported by Avery, that the Supervisor and Clerk sign a Quit Claim Deed relinquishing interest in easement on the west 102 feet of Lot 25, Supervisors Middlebelt 10 Mile, Plat No. 2. Motion carried unanimously.

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
