(Continued from Page 1A) James Reed, Assistant Superintendent for the Farmington School District, and Monaghan Beahan of Our Lady of Sorrows both were present at the Monday night meeting to answer questions posed by councilmen. It was their opinion that the roadway is getting considerable use from the general public.

ALSO PRESENT representing the schools was their consulting engineer, Emil Tretow. He pointed out that several improvements to the roadway in recent years have made the lower portion of the drive "as strong as asphalt can get." He further stated that a minor program of road repairs is all that would be necessary once the upper portion of the roadway was also brought up to standards.

Widening of the roadway which is called for in the City's ordinance covering the take-over of private roads was felt to be one problem which needed more study. The few feet which the drive lacks of being within the City's minimum requirements for width would require a major expense to correct. Since it was felt no parking was necessary along the roadway, this requirement might be waived, however, who should bear the cost of repairing or improving existing pavement still remains the big issue yet to be resolved.

MISS LAM's group of Volunteers will help inhabitants of city slums define community problems and initiate solutions on a self-help basis. Some 300 other Peace Corpsmen are already assisting Peru's development by working in education, health and community development.

Rapidly expanding with new arrivals from rural areas, city slums pose a serious economic problem to many Latin American nations.

The government of Peru has requested Volunteers to show residents of these areas that they can help themselves.

Peace Corpsmen will teach skills such as carpentry, masonry, child care and sanitation. They will initiate recreation programs, youth organizations and help build schools and water systems. In short, Volunteer assignments will be to do what their communities need most.

MISS LAM received ten weeks of intensive training at San Diego State College. Her instruction emphasized the Spanish language, methods of community development, U.S. history and culture, U.S. history and institutions and world affairs.

The departing Volunteers will join almost 10,000 other Americans now working for the Peace Corps in 46 African, Asian and Latin American nations. Requests for additional Volunteers received daily from these countries. More than 5,000 Volunteers were trained this summer and fall.

Applicants interested in late fall or subsequent training program should contact their questionnaires now (available at your local Post Office) and take the Peace Corps Placement Test, given the second Saturday of each month with over Federal service exams are given.
