Urge Mothers Make Teens Kitchen Lovers

"Don't chase your children out of the kitchen—invite them in and let them learn to be at home working with food," says a lady who has fun following her own advice. So did her children. The lady is Ida Bailey Allen, long recognized as one of America's leading food experts. The author of 55 books on food, cooking, nutrition, home-making and women's interests. Mrs. Allen—actually Dr. Allen—is a widely read food columnist and an award-winning radio personality. She is also a sought-after guest speaker, and a frequent consultant on food here and abroad.

Now a grandmother, Mrs. Allen, who taught her children—two boys and a girl—to cook, said that her grandchildren are learning to be at home in the kitchen too. Mrs. Allen's advice to mothers is to welcome the children in the kitchen. Let them help with simple food preparation tasks when they're little. Talk to them about food as you're preparing it—tell them what's good for them and why. Don't force them, but encourage them to try new foods.

Teach them to make dishes that can be proud of serving—simple ones at first, then gradually work up to the more elaborate ones. They should also learn how to plan balanced meals and how to prepare and serve whole meals.

"The proper cooking equipment is important in helping children to succeed—there's nothing more discouraging than failures," Mrs. Allen warned. One big help in cooking success is a new electric range with automatic controls. The timers and thermostat take the trouble out of cooking—and children are notably impatient about spending a time fussing over things.

The even, controlled heat assures consistent results—and good results, if instructions are followed carefully, Mrs. Allen pointed out. "My grandchildren are learning on a new electric range," she said. "So far, it's mainly watching—for instance, they love to sit on the kitchen floor and watch through the oven window as the popovers pop. But soon they'll be learning to make the popovers themselves."

"I wish my mothers—and fathers who like to cook—would encourage the children to learn to cook, too."
