Your Child's Homework

Recently an approach to essay writing was outlined in this column. An approach to book reports is included here. Once again it is realized that no formula is ever completely adequate. This method is merely intended as an aid for the child who has difficulty in getting started.

1. Have your child summarize the story of the novel in his own words, not those of the book.
2. Have your child name the two minor characters and relate what they contribute to the total story. Your child should state how they express the main character, if at all.
3. Have your child state the most interesting point in the book.
4. Have your child state how the main characters change as a result of the events — the change in attitudes and behavior.
5. Have your child specifically state why the book was interesting or uninteresting. Don't allow him to use such expression as "because I like it."
6. Have your child state why the author began the book.

8. Have your child explain exactly what the main character is in conflict with. Is it an individual? Is it an idea? Is it society?

9. Have your child state whether the book has influenced his attitudes.

10. Have your child give three to six quotations, illustrating what seems to be the author's viewpoint or philosophy.

11. Have your child write the final section in such a way that the reader will be left in suspense.
