As a result, the "Growing Up Committee" feels a void exists in an area of education should begin almost at birth and continue to adulthood.

The following tentative program of sex education for parents and teachers does not include classroom teaching of sex for children was submitted by the committee through Supt. Harrison.

The proposal to rezone lots in the Farmington Little Farms Subdivision from M 3 Heavy Industrial to M 2 Medium Industrial drew questions from the residents about the possibility of parking garages in the area.

The two bumper lots between the industrial and residential areas were the source of some concern to home owners in the area. They feared that these two lots would eventually be rezoned commercial and the home owners would lose the bumper strip.

One of the owners of the two lots in question asked: "Why should I be in the bumper zone between the commercial and the industrial zones? I can't do anything with my property the way it is now."

He was advised to take his appeal to the planning commission for possible rezoning.

A proposal to rezone Lots 15 and 16 from R 1, one family to R 1 P, one family parking district, on Shawnee west of Farmington Road is also a part of the proposal changes. Residents of the area objected strenuously to this, maintaining that it would strain an existing traffic problem on the street.

Lot 16 which has been purchased as a church parking lot is completely surrounded by residential property and existing and proposed regulations require that it be built around this area also drew the ire of citizens.

The consensus of opinion was to leave the area just as it is. Drawing very little or no fire from the residents were the proposals to:

- Rezone four lots west of Farmington Road on Oakland Avenue, north of Grand River Avenue, from Two Family District to One Family District.
- Rezone an acreage tract in Section 27 from One family to a multi-family district.
- Change the zoning for 3.25 acres on the south side of Grand River Avenue west of the American Legion Property to Multi-Family (1 Bedroom) District from General Commercial.
- Four lots in the Assessor's Hatton Gardens Subdivision rezoned from One family to General Commercial; and
- Rezone lots on Farmington and Gill Roads from one family parking to industrial.

Water Service OKed for Sub

A public hearing on the necessity of installing water in Meadowbrook Hills Subdivision was part of the agenda of the Farmington Township Board meeting, on Monday, Jan. 11.

According to the law, the Supervisor was empowered to get bids on the water service, unless 20% of the landowners file written objections. There were no objections submitted to the Board.

Supervisor Curt Hall presented an estimate of what the Township engineers felt the job would cost. The bids have to come within 10 per cent of the estimate before work can begin.

The total estimate was \$171,800, or \$80.84 per person. Of this, \$143,000 is for the water main and pertinent installation, and \$28,000 is for the pressure reducing valve and well pit.
