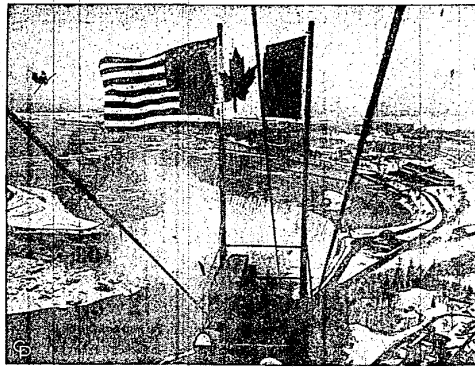


**KHRUSHCHEV IN RETIREMENT HERE**—This is the somewhat palatial government retreat of Ustovo where deposed Nikita Khrushchev is living—and—sneaking—in retirement. It is a dacha (villa) in a pine forest on the Moscow River, some 25 miles from the capital city.

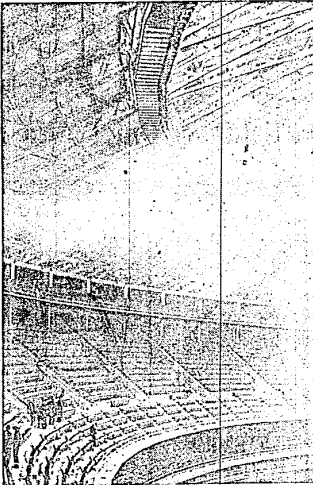

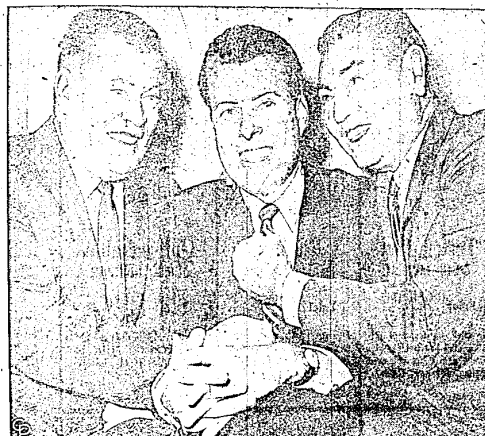

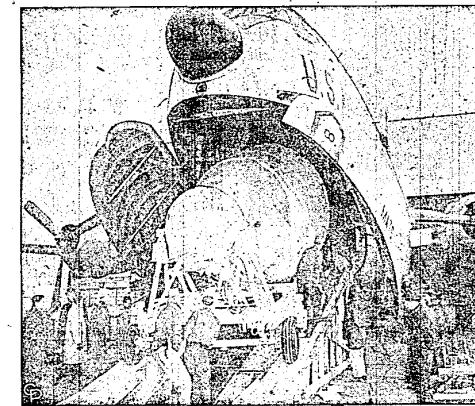

**GEMINI TO CAPE KENNEDY**—The two-man Gemini spacecraft, scheduled to carry astronauts Virgil I. Grissom and John W. Young on a three-orbit mission early this year, is loaded into a plane at McDonnell Aircraft, St. Louis, Mo., for transport to Cape Kennedy, Fla. The Gemini is 19 feet high, 10 feet in diameter at the base.

He is 5-foot-9, weighs 175-200, has blond hair, blue eyes, ruddy complexion. Crooked nose tattooed on his right shoulder and a heart on his left. He is 32.

**\$100,000 BAIL**—Harry S. Stonehill, 47, who stayed in the Philippines after World War II and amassed a fortune of \$30-\$40 million before being ordered out, is shown in San Antonio, Tex., after posting \$100,000 bond on charges of mislabeling cargo. The government says he labeled three export crates threatening machines when they contained cigarrat cutting machines.
