**Open Drive
For Fair
Housing**

A campaign for signatures on fair housing covenants will be conducted during Brotherhood Week by the Farmington Human Relations Council.

The cards, which include a statement against discrimination in housing, will be available from Council members and cooperating churches.

Brotherhood Week is Feb. 21 through 28.

"The covenant cards give those who favor equality in housing an opportunity to band together around a simple statement of belief," said John Mill-wood, council chairman.

"They have been used elsewhere to show a desire to accept changes in housing patterns peacefully and with good will."

More than 2,000 people have signed covenant cards in metropolitan Detroit. A recent campaign in the Grosse Pointes obtained more than 400 signatures.

The cards, obtained from the Greater Detroit Committee for Fair Housing Practices, state: "I believe that every person has the moral and legal right to rent, buy, or build a home anywhere without restrictions based on race, religion, or national origin."

"I believe it is imperative for our metropolitan Detroit area that all persons of good will unite with others of like conviction to take an active role in helping to achieve this freedom of opportunity in housing."

"Therefore, I will welcome into my neighborhood any responsible person of whatever race, religion, or national origin, and I will work with him to build, improve, and maintain a community which is good for all."

The cards contain the provision that the names of the signers are not their addresses, but may be published together with not less than 2,000 other names.

The decision to conduct the card campaign was made Wednesday at a meeting of the Council's board of trustees.

The 150-member Council, formed nearly one and a half years ago, is a non-profit, non-political organization that meets regularly in Farmington churches.

The next meeting is at 8 p.m. March 22 at the Antioch Lutheran Church, 33350 W. Thirteenth Mile Rd.
